SALEM SIGNS THREE HARD HITTING PLAYERS

Senators to Play Here Next Sunday

The outfield of the Salem Senators, hitherto the weak spot in the lineup of the Capital City team, has been replaced by three hard hitters and when the Senators come for their first game with the Eugene team of the Willamette Valley league Sunday one of the hardest hitting aggregations in the league will be seen in action.

Harold Olinger, left handed frosh hitter at the University of Oregon this past season, will be in left field. He is a natural hitter, and was one of the hardest hitting youngsters on the frosh lineup.

Quinn, whose first name hasn't been announced as yet in valley league circles, will be in center field. He was the star outfielder of the Oregon State college nine several years ago, and is considered one of the fastest outfielders in the western section of the state. He is an ideal lead-off man on the batting list, and is another left-handed swinger. He gets his hits often, according to the score sheet.

The third outfielder is even better known here than Quinn. He is Buck Grayson, who played with Eugene for several games, and batted toward the top of the list. His home is in Portland, and he was too expensive to bring down here for every game with his expenses running both to and from Eugene.

So Salem took him over, Salem being much closer to Portland, and will have less transportation charges to handle when he plays. He is a left handed hitter, too, and a hard hitter as well.

The rest of the Salem team, which was considered strong all season, remains the same, with the bolstered outfield, the Senators should be one of the strongest threatening teams in the circuit.

WEBFOOT TENNIS STAR ESTABLISHES RECORD

Bradshaw Harrison Wins 2 Northwest Championships

Bradshaw Harrison, tennis sensation of the Pacific coast, who will be eligible for the University of Oregon next season, has just won two titles in his tournament play this summer. Harrison won many singles championships in 1927, taking the Oregon State, Washington State, Pacific Northwest as well as several others. This, in itself, was no little feat.

But in his campaign this summer, covering the same ground as in 1927, the coming Webfoot star is repeating. For the first time in history of annual tournaments the Pacific northwest single title was won by the same player in two successive years.

Harrison accomplished that feat last week when he defeated Sherman Lockwood, another coming Oregon tennis wizard, 1-6, 6-3, 4-6, 6-2, at Tacoma. Harrison, this week, will battle with the leading coast stars at Seattle in an effort to retain his present crown of 1927 champion. If he comes through again, and he is seeded No. 1, he will again add a great honor to his already sensational record.

Bradshaw Harrison, who hails originally from San Francisco, is one of the greatest stars on the long Pacific coast yet he is a victim of circumstances which keeps him from representing the west in national tournament play in the east this summer.

Because Harrison came to the University of Oregon last fall and as his home was originally in California he was barred entrance in the northwest sectionals held at Vancouver, B. C., early this summer for a trip east. Harrison had defeated all the players entered in this tournament and was the best of the lot, yet he couldn't compete for the trip east.

The Webfoot star always has aspired to reach his peak in the east, and he was determined to enter the national championship individual championships. If he goes as planned Oregon should gain the national title.

TUNNEY SAYS HE WILL NOT QUIT AFTER MATCH

Is Second Denial in Week; Heeney Works Hard

SPECULATOR, N. Y., July 17.—(AP)—Broadcasting his second denial in a week, Gene Tunney tonight said that he had no intention of quitting the ring after his heavyweight title bout with Tom Heeney on July 28.

When Tunney was informed that Tex Rickard had been credited with a statement that the champion planned to retire, he replied that he had never discussed this subject with the promoter.

"Why should I retire?" Tunney asked. "The two worst years of my championship are now behind me. The public is now accustomed to me. From now on it will be just pie and cake. Why, it's ridiculous. Where can I earn more than I do in the ring?"

Looking Better
It will be an improved Tunney who defends his world's heavyweight title against Tom Heeney on July 28, thinks T. E. Donoghue, president of the national boxing association.

He arrived here today from Hartford, Conn., in time to watch Tunney take his final workout Sunday. The champion made an exceptionally good showing against his sparring partners and when the performance ended Mr. Donoghue said:

"Tunney is still a wonder. His workout amply repaid me for my long journey. He looks a bit bigger than a year ago but he has put on the weight where it will do him the most good."

Heeney Works Out
FAIRHAVEN, N. J., July 17.—(AP)—With a scorching sun burning down on the old barn housing the indoor ring Tom Heeney launched his intensive training drive today for his world's heavyweight championship match with Gene Tunney in New York a week from Tuesday night.

The challenger started his last eight days of training by working indoors, in the heat of mid-afternoon, after boxing four nights in his outdoor ring. He traded punches with two sparring partners, James J. Braddock, a Jersey City 170 pounder, and James J. Lawless, a Harrison, N. J., heavyweight. He stepped two rounds with each.

He weighed 205 pounds when he started, as a result of a day's lay-off but presently melted off four or five pounds in his workout. His broad shoulders were glistening with perspiration when he started punching the bag and his drops of sweat splashed off his forehead when he climbed into the ring.

YALE STAR WILL TAKE PART IN TWO CONTESTS
Macaulay Smith Competes In 10,000 Meter Event

S. S. PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT EN ROUTE TO AMSTERDAM, July 17.—(AP)—Ambitious to emulate the Finnish distance ace, Macaulay Smith, Yale cross-country star will run in the 10,000 meter event in the Olympic games as well as the 5000 meter race.

The decision to allow Smith to compete in two events was made when the final list of America's entries in the track and field events was drawn up tonight. Except for this one alteration the list disclosed no changes in the decisions made prior to the departure of the team from New York.

The final date on which the entries for each competing nation in the Olympic games does not come until July 19 but the committee arrived at its decisions tonight and immediately radioed the names to Amsterdam.

The Yale star won his place on the American Olympic team by taking second place to Leo Lermond in the final tryout for the 5000 meter event at Boston. In the eastern sectional trials at New York, Smith finished ahead of the Boston distance ace. Smith now believes that he has a better chance of placing in the 10,000 meter run than in the shorter event in spite of the Finnish stars, Paavo Nurmi and Willis Ritola.

HEENEY MAY WIN IN LAST ROUNDS

Tom Has Snappy Chance to Defeat Champion Gene, in Opinion of Some Fight Fans

The jolly old tidings from training camps of Gene Tunney and Tom Heeney are a bit contradictory. Some who have gazed upon the champion's efforts up in the Adirondacks have breezed back into the teaming purloins all excited over "Tunney's splendid condition." But just about as great a number, and men comparatively expert, speak like this:

"Tunney has grown rusty and shows it plainly. Long layoffs have helped anybody and Tunney is no exception. His judgment of distance, both in fitting volleys and in avoiding them needs plenty of tuning up."

Heeney, never much in a gym, is running true to form in his camp. Tommaso hits and mixes with about equal regularity; he ducks and blocks and sidesteps, but just about as often he fails to duck, block or sidestep. So much is the opinion of one delegation that looked him over.

Has Snappy Chance
But others really are conceding Heeney a snappy chance against Tunney, based on his workouts. They claim he looks vastly improved, hits harder and steps more briskly.

All of which proves that two men never see anything exactly alike. Tunney, as is the ambition of every champion, yearns to knock the challenger loose from the moorings of consciousness. Nothing short of a knockout victory will content him. So his training seems to be concentrated with that point largely in mind.

"The champion," reports one of those who have looked him over, "is centering on developing a killer in punch. This has caused a change of tactics. In the past Tunney always has jabbed with great power and, naturally, the impetus of that straight left hand has made it difficult to shoot the right across at almost the same instant."

"But now he's working on a flicking left that doesn't carry his whole body in the movement, thus leaving him in position to whip over a terrific right. In other words, his aim is to perfect a sort of shift by which he can bluff Heeney with his left and make Heeney slip his head directly into the pathway of a crushing right."

"Apparently Tunney means to use that stunt to trick Heeney into position where he can knock him cold—in a hurry."

Heeney Loses No Sleep
All of which, of course, has been conveyed to Heeney who hasn't lost any sleep over it. "Hitting me—and putting me to sleep are different things," quoth Tommaso, with an air of indifference. "Sure Tunney will attack me—do it plenty of times, I suppose. But that isn't worrying me. I've got a good jaw, I have."

Heeney isn't nursing any real knockout hope. If he could bump off Tunney, he'd be quite delighted. But Tommaso's hope lies in outscoring Tunney.

His battle plan is simple. He'll let Tunney punch as much and as often as he likes. Those that he can't will be avoided. Those he can't be taken. And all the while Tommaso will be punching and clinging to the hope that Tunney is wearing.

"After about ten rounds," says Tommaso, "I'm thinking that the champion will be a bit leg weary and arm weary and then I'll go in and do some first-class blacksmith work on him."

Sounds simple, doesn't it? And Heeney insists it's going to be just like that—with real sincerity and complete belief. The world may not think Tommaso has a chance but Tommaso brims with confidence.

In the meantime, the hot polio suspense complete decision. The general idea is to concede an easy victory to Tunney on the assumption that "class will tell." But if
