

PINNED BENEATH HIS CAR

JESS L. HOUGHTON HAS NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH

Light Truck Falls Down Grade and Imprisons Owner For Several Hours

FLORENCE, Ore., July 19. — Jess L. Houghton, a well-known farmer of the North Fork district, had a narrow escape from death Wednesday when his light delivery truck turned over on him, pinning him beneath it.

Mr. Houghton was returning home from Florence and had a young calf in the back of the car. When near the Vanderburg place he looked back to see if the animal was riding all right. In doing so he drove the car off the bank and it landed in a berry and bramble thicket, ten feet below. The car turned completely over on Mr. Houghton. The accident happened about 1 o'clock in the afternoon and Mr. Houghton lay beneath the car until about 5 when he was discovered by a neighbor, J. E. Earle.

Mr. Houghton had presence of mind enough to whistle a piece of two-by-four in the window pressed against his chest. The task was finished and by the time help arrived he was resting more comfortably. He could not rest so with the car on top of him. Mr. Earle stated that he passed by the spot three times. The first two times he heard someone calling but he presumed it was children of the neighborhood. On the third trip he investigated and found Mr. Houghton. He could not lift the car alone, so went for help. When Mr. Houghton was removed from the wreckage he was able to climb the bank by himself and apparently suffered no ill effects.

MINISTER IS GREAT HIKER

REV. A. E. WHEELER WORKS ON LANE COAST
