FANS AROUSED AT SUSPENSION

Boston Is in Great Lather Over Trouble With Carrigan, Red Sox Leader

The kiddy metropolis of Boston, Mass., is in a great lather these days because of a couple of things as follows:

(1) The suspension of Bill Carrigan, the Red Sox boss, and
(2) The high price of peanuts, heated albedales, soda-pop and similar items of food and drink.
"Barnard went off half cocked," is what they say of the action of the American League president in suspending Bill, the managerial bloke. And then they go on and explain, to-wit:

"A decision was rendered by an umpire, Carrigan didn't think it was okay Jake. So he hopped over to the umpire and by word of mouth and by the waving of his arms tried to make the umpire see the error of his ways. While he was doing that, some guy sitting in the stands had a pop bottle and not knowing what else to do with it heaved it onto the playing field. A couple of other guys did ditto."
