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POLAR SEARCH DELAYED

ICE-BREAKER KRASSIN MUST BE REPAIRED, IN REPORT

Boat Will be Held up For Two Weeks Before Search For Members of Italia Crew Continues

MOSCOW, July 20.—(AP)—The Russian ice-breaker Krassin will be further delayed in resuming search for missing members of the Italia's crew by the need of repairs, the Russian commission announced today.

The repairs necessary are such that they cannot be effected in Kings Bay and the Krassin will have to proceed to the nearest Swedish or Norwegian port.

The aviator Chukhovsky will remain at Kings Bay where he will repair his plane, damaged in a recent flight, and make trial flights while he awaits the return of the Krassin.

The necessity of amputating the leg of Captain Alfredo Mariano, survivor of the Italia's "walking party" was the primary reason for the Krassin's hasty return to Kings Bay from the coast of northeast Alaska, the rescue commission announced.

Captain Mariano's leg had been frozen and gangrene set in.

The Swedish aviators at Kings Bay have offered to put two small planes at the Krassin's disposal if their government permits.

It is expected that the Krassin will be able to resume her rescue work in about two weeks. In the meantime it is hoped that the Russian and Swedish planes will be able to fly over the area where it is thought possible traces of the Italia and Amundsen parties might be found.

FEED RATES HELD HIGH

TILLAMOOK TROUBLES ARE TOLD AT HEARING

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—(AP) The troubles of Tillamook county, Oregon, and the fame of Tillamook cheese brightened the hearing of the interstate commerce commission grain rate hearings here today.

A certain degree of grave dignity which has heretofore marked the proceedings, was punctured more than once as Carl Haberlach, manager of the Tillamook County Creamery association, unfolded his story of the cheese that made a county famous.

Haberlach's presence at a hearing on grain rates was explained when he reported his association purchased annually 10,000 tons of hay and from 5,000 to 7,000 tons of feed.

Western Oregon dairymen, Haberlach said, are at a disadvantage in competing with western Washington, because points in the latter territory enjoy the same through rates from the east as does Seattle. On the other hand, he said, dairymen in the coast counties of Oregon must pay the rate to Portland from eastern points, plus the local rate from Portland to the point of destination—in this case, Tillamook.

ing that is an issue would be left out.

The nominee already is shaping up his acceptance speech in his mind. He had an overnight guest at the executive mansion Senator Pittman of Nevada, who was chairman of the platform committee at the Houston convention and will head the committee that formally will appraise Smith of his nomination.

Platform is Topic

The visit of the western senator, his second here in a fortnight, afforded Governor Smith and him an opportunity not only to discuss the points emphasized in the Democratic platform, but the approaching notification ceremony.

Pittman left at noon for New York and Washington, leaving it to the nominee to determine when the ceremony should take place.

Smith said that a date could not be determined until he learned just when a nationwide radio hook-up could be arranged. He indicated that he would reach a decision before the first of the week.

It has been determined to hold the ceremony at night on the east steps of the state capitol. Arrangements are being made to handle a throng in the adjoining park, and Albany officials are predicting a crowd of at least 100,000. In the event of bad weather, it was said today that rather than attempt to postpone the event, Governor Smith might deliver his speech in the relatively small assembly chamber, which could accommodate the notification committee, newspaper correspondents and a limited number of guests only.

The Smith notification is certain to come after that for Herbert Hoover, fixed for August 11 in California.
