

### ANNUAL CAMP MEETING OF METHODISTS OPENS

Sessions Begin at Cottage Grove Tabernacle CONTINUE FOR 10 DAYS Many Ministers From Different Parts of Northwest in Attendance

(Register Lane County Special) COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., July 20.—The eighth annual camp meeting of the Methodist conference at their tabernacle here and the session will continue for ten days. Rev. S. J. Chaney of Eugene is platform manager and announces that the attendance at the opening session last night far exceeded expectations. The tabernacle was comfortably filled.

Rev. L. M. Grigby of Tacoma, gave the opening address. His sermon was taken from Mark, "What things soever you desire, when you believe that you receive, they shall have them." He spoke of the general need of a revival and the possibility of it. He illustrated his sermon by various experiences of his life. Grigby also spoke this morning and Rev. Mr. Bernard tonight.

Twelve Ministers Attend About twelve ministers and their families are now present and more are expected to come. About 12 tents are up and several rooms full. Rev. George Bonnard will preach Sunday morning and evening and will also entertain by singing "The Old Rugged Cross" of which he is the author. Bishop Titus Lowe, incoming bishop of the Northwest area, will be present part of the time. Bishop Lowe has taken the place of Bishop Shepard who was transferred to Paris.

Rev. Joseph Knotts of Roseburg is president of the camp meeting and Rev. C. G. Morris of Creswell has charge of the grounds. J. A. Linn, local pastor, is in charge of boarding. Song services will be given at each service under the direction of Rev. J. F. Ebas of Eugene with Mrs. Besse Sutcliffe at the piano. Miss Dorothy Johnson of Portland has charge of the young people's services.

It is expected that about 1000 will be in attendance Sunday. Retired Minister Present Among the campers already here are Rev. W. H. Meyer, retired minister from Eugene and family. Rev. Meyer has his family with him and has probably been attending camp meetings for 50 years or more as he is 84 years old.

Contract Award by Council to Power Equipment Company of Portland (Register Lane County Special) COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., July 20.—The Power Equipment company of Portland was awarded the contract for installing a 2000-gallon pump for the standby service system in the southern part of Cottage Grove last night at a special meeting of the city council. The price is to be \$6200 for the plant complete and work on it will begin at once.

There was six bids for the contract, which were referred to the city engineer and water committee and action was taken last night. Godard and Randall, local contractors were among the bidders. At the special meeting permission was granted to Chas. Gettys to paint the machine shop of H. A. Miller and renew its foundation. A petition from C. E. Umphrey to hang a banner advertising the camp meeting now in session was refused and the banner on Fifth street in front of the Morris service station was ordered taken down.
