Are your bed linen shelves stacked with fluffy clean blankets and immaculate quilts and comforters? You should have them ready for winter use. Can't you imagine a sharp cold night with all your nose buried under fluffy blankets that smell—oh! so clean and sweet? Pineapple Peach Marmalade. Pare and chop 5 cups ripe peaches. Simmer quite slowly until thick. Add the juice of 1 lemon, 5 cups sugar and 1/2 cup grated pineapple. Continue simmering until mixture is quite thick and seal at once. More pineapple may be added if desired.

SEVERAL FIRES BREAK OUT IN LANE COUNTY

Barn, Other Buildings Are Destroyed Here

DAMAGE IS OVER \$1000

Grass Near Oakridge In Flames and Old Cutting Near Mabel Pours Smoke Into City

With temperature above 100 degrees and humidity down to 20, weather was just right for fires yesterday and several of them broke out.

One fire was reported at the Cascade national forest office. It is on private land and is not endangering timber. Another blaze was burning near Mabel on a old cutting and it too had touched no timber.

Small boys playing with matches in the rear of a barn belonging to A. L. Tilton, 1403 Cross avenue, are believed to have started the fire. Flames caught in stacked lumber in some plane boxes and the tinder dry barn was next to catch fire. The barn was completely destroyed, a garage nearby was considerably damaged and a chicken house, belonging to Mrs. Rhoda Wells, 1299 Cross avenue, was destroyed.

Sparks flew onto the roofs of the houses in front of the barn and difficulty was experienced in keeping them from catching on fire. Dry grass several hundred feet away was burned when sparks struck it.

The Tilton barn was valued at \$800. Mr. Tilton said a part of which is covered by insurance. Furniture and other things stored in the barn will bring the damage up to about \$1000. The Wells chicken house cost more than \$200. The fire started about 4 o'clock.

Another grass fire was put out by the fire department at Eighteenth avenue and Willamette street about 3 o'clock.

Ash Farm Affire. The fire reported at the Cascade forest office was well under control last night and will probably be extinguished by this morning, it was said. It started yesterday afternoon on the J. D. Ash farm near Oakridge in dry grass near the road. It is believed that it was started by a cigarette.

Other fires starting last week were still burning in several places in this vicinity, but all are believed to be under control.

AIR FRANCHISE SOUGHT

HOBBI AIRWAYS SEEK AIRPORT PRIVILEGES HERE

Exclusive Rights For Five Years Sought; Proposal to be Studied by City

Exclusive rights for local freight and passenger airway carrying and aviation instruction at the Eugene airport was requested of the city last night by the Hobi Airways through F. D. Hobi of Aberdeen, Wash. The request was made as a result of a meeting here last week at which the proposal was briefly outlined. The franchise is wanted for a period of five years.

In addition to passenger and freight privileges at the airport, the company wants exclusive rights for a gasoline and oil service station for planes. The city will be paid five per cent of the receipts for passenger and freight flying and two cents a gallon for gasoline sold through the station.

Instructors to serve in the school will be experienced men, it was said, and will hold department of commerce pilots' certificates.

The matter referred to the judiciary committee and the park board which report at the next meeting of the council after taking it up with the aviation committee of the chamber of commerce.

The council last night voted to adopt the department of commerce rules for airports. The rules have been adopted in all parts of the country, said Carl G. Washburne, who made the motion.

EMBROIDERY TAKEN ALONG ON JAUNT

White House Attaches Were Reluctant as to Actual Results of Angling Expedition

SUPERIOR, Wis., July 21.—(AP)—Two fishermen instead of the usual one, started out from Cedar Island lodge over the Brule river today in quest of trout. Mrs. Coolidge decided suddenly it was time for her to do her share in providing a fish dinner for the Coolidge household, and joined her husband in the frail canoe which John Larock, the Chippewa guide, was holding fast to the landing stage.

Mrs. Coolidge was not sure, however, that angling alone would keep her interested and amused for several hours so she took her embroidery along. Alternating casting her own line without watching her husband fish and with attending to her needle work, Mrs. Coolidge spent a large portion of the day on the placid waters of the Brule. She was in the boat for the first time in her life.

As to the actual results of the expedition, White House attaches were reticent.

Mr. Coolidge found time to attend to business today in addition to fishing.

Now that the successor to Dr. Hubert Work in the cabinet has been selected, the chief executive is devoting much thought to a suitable successor to Secretary Hoover when the proper time shall have come for the latter's retirement.

Mr. Hoover's resignation will be accepted by the president as soon as the Republican presidential nominee shall have attended to certain commerce department matters on the Pacific coast.

The entire Coolidge household planned to attend church at Brule tomorrow as usual. Arrangements for special police service were made by the Brule authorities in view of the increasingly large crowds which have been gathering there on Sundays.

LONG FLIGHT ANNOUNCED

LONDON TO LOS ANGELES IS AIM OF NAVIGATOR

LOS ANGELES, July 20.—(AP)—Captain Harry Lyon, navigator of the Southern Cross on its long flight to Australia recently, announced plans for a London-to-Los Angeles aerial trip today.

The plane which will be built here will be piloted by Captain William Lancaster and Mrs. Keith Miller, air idols of Great Britain. Lyon will act as navigator.

Announcement of plans for the flight next spring were made at a luncheon here by Lyon.

"Negotiations are now under way between Captain Lancaster, Mrs. Miller and myself to have a special three motored plane built in Los Angeles," Lyon said.
