STEEL BEING LAID IN NEW SPRINGFIELD SPAN

Structure Expected to be Finished Month Ahead of Contract Time

(Register Lane County Special.) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., July 23.—Work of laying the upper part of the steel work in the McKenzie highway bridge was begun today and is expected to last the remainder of the week, according to those in charge of the construction work. Laying of the lower steel work was completed last week.

Exceptionally rapid progress is being made on the bridge. The structure is expected to be finished by January 1 or about a month ahead of the time called for in the contract. The contract time did not take into consideration the additional span which is being constructed.

As soon as the steel is put into place the work of the riveters will start. This is one of the most important parts of the building process and is expected to take quite a while.
