TRUCK HITS PARKED CAR AT SPRINGFIELD

Function City Man Receives Broken Leg When Knocked Down By Own Machine

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., July 23.—Charles Nelson received a broken leg and a lacerated hand, and P. C. Lauridsen a badly bruised jaw at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon in a traffic accident on Main street near Second. Both men are residents of Junction City.

Mr. Nelson and Mr. Lauridsen were returning to get into the car of the former after visiting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Larson. The two men were about to get in when a truck driven by C. R. Sylvester came along. The driver lost control of the machine and it crashed into the parked Nelson car.

Mr. Nelson was thrown to the pavement and the front wheels of his car passed over him. He was taken to a hospital in Eugene for treatment. The car was only slightly damaged.

Springfield Resident Rushed to Portland to Veterans' Bureau Hospital

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., July 23.—The first swimming accident to be reported here this season occurred Monday evening when Trubert V. Henderson, local bowling alley proprietor, was painfully injured while bathing in the Willamette river. He was taken to the Portland veterans' hospital Monday evening.

Mr. Henderson was floating down a riffle in the river on his back when he struck a sharp snag. His body was penetrated about five inches and his bladder was narrowly missed.

The injured man was first given aid by a local physician but as soon as the seriousness of his wound was realized it was decided to send him to a hospital. Mrs. M. B. Huntly of the American Legion auxiliary succeeded in making arrangements over the telephone for him to be taken into the veterans' hospital.

He was taken by ambulance to Eugene and placed on the Etna limited.

gets for his produce and what I pay for it. He gets a third of the price paid by the consumer and the distributor gets two-thirds. But if there were no distributors, I suppose the stuff would rot in the ground.

"Some day I'm going to be a farmer myself."

Ever since he was a child he has heard of the roses grown here the year around, he said in acknowledging a gift of roses given him by the local residents.

"Of course we have roses the year around in New York," he smiled, "but they are under glass."

Western Farmers Wiser

Farmers in New York are stubborn and that is where western producers have the best of them. Mayor Walker said. Here they learned to grade their produce and get the highest market price while in his home state the farmers were too stubborn to follow this principle.

From the time the train stopped until it was ready to leave again for the north, Mayor Walker chatted with the local residents. He shook hands with all around him.

Jimmy at Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—Gotham's gay mayor—the irrepressible and debonair Jimmy Walker of New York City, arrived in Portland tonight for three hours of rapid-fire entertainment.

Governor Patterson, Mayor Baker and a committee of more than half a hundred others greeted the mayor and his party at the union station.

Mayor Jimmy was just beginning to cool off from his torrid excursion down the Willamette valley on one of the hottest days of the year, but he found time to declare that the election in November would be what he technically termed a "pushover" for Governor Alfred E. Smith of the home state.

Mr. Walker's cool silk pajamas had disappeared since his stop in Eugene, where, clad in them he addressed a group of perspiring Democrats who had gathered at the station.

Jimmy was in more formal attire when he reached Portland, and after brief greetings he and his party were bundled into waiting automobiles and speeded to dinner, to be followed by Walker's turn at the KGW microphone and a short sightseeing trip around the city, and then by his departure northward.

found to be surprisingly low. The restrictions probably will be in effect indefinitely. The rigid restrictions were necessitated by the continued hot weather and the water consumption resulting therefrom.

At Pendleton today, with the 112 degree temperature, it was the first time since July 11, 1922, that such heat had been felt. A hot wind added to the discomfort.

But three times in the history of Walla Walla has it been hotter than it was today when a maximum of 109 was reached. The previous high marks here in 1898, and twice in 1905.

The Dallas Sweeties still another heat record was established at the Dallas with the thermometer up to 109. Considerable damage to the apricot crop is anticipated if the heat wave does not break soon, as the ripe fruit is literally cooking on the trees.

Orchardists report wheat harvesting in the Dallas district has been suspended as neither men nor horses can stand the high temperatures.

Grants Pass today experienced slight relief although the temperature dropped from 113 degrees yesterday to 109 today. Clouds promised a shower late today.

The temperature in Bend fell one degree short of a 15-year mark today when it reached 100 degrees, two points above yesterday's maximum.

Medford Cooler A cloud haze and a very light breeze, together with threatening clouds along the horizon brought

slightly cooler weather today at Medford with a maximum of 103 degrees. This was two degrees less than yesterday.

All heat records for the year were smashed at Salem today when the mercury halted in its ascent at 102 degrees.

A Hood River some concern was felt by orchardists who predicted that the apple crop would be further damaged by sunburn. The mark today was 101 degrees.

Other thermometers recording were: Roseburg 103, La Grande 102, Yakima 108.5, Baker 98, Aberdeen 94, Spokane 104, Pasco 107, Condon 110, Boise 102.

breaking down of all laws and the administration of justice.

That wherever these conditions exist there is a tendency toward disrespect for all law and a growing skepticism concerning the integrity of all public officials.

That the enormous profits derived from the bootleg industry being unlawful and their considered legitimate prey, have excited the cupidity of politicians and state and government officials generally to such an extent that bribery and corruption have become of common occurrence. Therein is to be found the real problem of crime and failure of justice in many parts of the country.

Among the remedies suggested in Lohaly's report were recommendations that:

Enforcement Needed Bureaus of criminal statistics should be organized to provide more adequate means of determining who are habitual offenders.

Habitual offenders should be permanently confined.

The prohibition laws should be enforced or repealed.

The bootlegger, the rum runner, the gangster, the hijacker, the bribe giver and the bribe taker," he said, "must be suppressed if orderly government under the law is to be restored."

A vigilant and informed public must insist upon honesty in their officials.

The report cited conditions in Chicago, New York and other metropolitan centers as centers of crime, and continued through a detailed study of conditions in other urban centers throughout the United States.

Killed for Revenge

COLORFUL RIVER RACE WON BY CHRIS GREENE

Wooden Betsy-Ann Forced to Eat Smoke of New Craft

THOUSANDS SEE CONTEST

Boilers Strain Until They Nearly Burst as Vessels Chug Madly in 20-mile Course on Ohio

NEW RICHMOND, Ohio, July 24.—The steel river packet Chris Greene tonight assumed the title of speed queen of the Ohio river and invested itself with a share in its rich tradition and racing lore by making the wooden, battered Betsy Ann eat its smoke in a 20-mile race up the river from Cincinnati.

Her whistles screaming, her hull trembling from the task and her twin funnels belching smoke and flames, the newer, finer, larger boat loomed through the twilight as the older, slower, smaller boat and 25 minutes of excitement such as the old river had not seen for years.

The scene took old river men back 30 years to the old racing heyday of the middlewest on the Ohio and Mississippi, to the day when the Robert E. Lee set the present record for the run from New Orleans to St. Louis and beat the Natchez by six hours.

The boats left Central bridge, at the foot of Broadway street in Cincinnati at 8:06 p. m. Crowds lined the river front and every bridge across the stream as they got under way, with the Betsy Ann on her rival's starboard. Hundreds of low, flat, motor boats and small river craft set their sirens screaming as they started up the stream, swollen by recent rains.

Commands Own Boat Captain Chris Greene commanded his own boat and took an early lead which he increased to two lengths at Coney Island amusement park, the half way point, and to 500 feet at New Palestine, but Captain Charles Ellsworth cut that down to two lengths again three miles from the finish.

Thousands of spectators lined the banks all the way, airplanes soared overhead and then returned to Cincinnati flying fields for more loads of passengers. The calliope on the steamship Island Queen started to play "Old Man River" and "Mississippi Mud."

Finish Watched Spectators hastened to the finish line as the cry of "Here they come!" with their boilers straining until it seemed they must burst, as the two boats went for the finish line and the Chris Greene barely got there first.

Frederick Way, of the Pittsburgh and Cincinnati packet lines, owner of the Betsy Ann, offered the gilt silk horns, won and defended by the Betsy Ann in many a hard fought race on the Mississippi and the Louisiana bayous in earlier days, as a trophy for the victor.

Captain M. O. Irwin, of the steamer Senator Cordill, Pittsburgh, telegraphed a challenge to the winner before the race, offering to deposit \$500, with his crew to put up a like amount as a wager on the outcome. River men hope for a renewal of the brave old days when frequent races decided the supremacy of the stream.
