Reason Elliott Dies
VETERAN OF CIVIL WAR AGED 85 YEARS
Had Been Resident of Cottage Grove for Past Nineteen Years

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., July 24.—Reason Gray Elliott, member of the G. A. R., post, aged 85 years, 10 months and 19 days, died at his home in this city this morning at 4 o'clock.

Mr. Elliott was born at Zanesville, Ohio, September 5, 1842, and moved to Iowa when a child living there until he reached manhood. He served four years in the civil war, in the Third Iowa Infantry, company H, and went to Missouri after the war. Here he was married to Mary E. Harmon of Memphis, Mo.

Five children survive, together with his third wife, Mrs. Mary Elliott of Cottage Grove. The children are Mrs. J. M. Longfellow, Cottage Grove; Arthur G. Elliott, Spokane, Wash.; C. H. Elliott, Eugene; Mrs. Mary F. Elliott, Pacific Grove, Calif.; Mrs. Nellie Lee, Marshfield. There are 15 grandchildren. A great-grandchild, two brothers, Arthur Elliott, Hartline, Wash., and Frank Elliott, of Iowa, also survive.

Mr. Elliott had been a resident of Cottage Grove the past 13 years. He was a member of the Free Methodist church and local G. A. R. Funeral services will be held Thursday at the Mills chapel. Miles Pfeiffer will officiate. Interment will be at the A. F. & M. I. O. O. F. cemetery.
