DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT TALKS AT GROVE MEETING

Rev. George Bennard, Well-Known Song Writer, Also Speaks; Bishop Lowe Arrives

COTTAGE GROVE, July 27.—Rev. Lynch, district superintendent of the Salem district of the Methodist church, of Salem, was the speaker at the Methodist camp meeting yesterday afternoon. Last evening Rev. George Bennard was the speaker, taking as his text, "How Shall We Escape if We Neglect So Great Salvation?" He stated that it was a pertinent question and unanswerable, one that even God cannot answer. "There is Hell for every sinner out of Christ and Heaven for every sinner out of Hell." "Neglect means loss in any part of life and spiritual loss is the greatest loss. Christ stands solidly among men and the church stands solidly among the institutions of the world, at the only institution of divine origin. There are many religions, but only one salvation." The pastor quoted Amanda Smith's definition of "Saved it to the uttermost" when asked the meaning of it, she said, "Why, honey, it means He can save you till there's nothing left of you to be saved."

ROAD WORK ADVANCING

PROGRESS IS REPORTED IN WESTERN LANE

McCloud Creek Bridge Nears Completion; Work Goes Ahead on Mapleton Hill Job

FLORENCE, Ore., July 27.—The bridge which is being built by Lane county over McCloud creek is nearing completion. Approaches to the span will be filled in by next week, and will be soon open to travel. The bridge will be used when the new market road over the Mapleton hill is completed.

Workmen on the Mapleton hill which is in the forest boundary are making splendid progress in lowering the grade and widening out the switch backs. The new road will follow along the old road-bed in some places and new construction is being made which will eliminate a number of the steeper switch back.

The county court plans to widen this road-bed next spring according to Commissioner Hurd.

The road from the Jim Dick place on the North Fork market road is under the supervision of H. M. Peterson, patrolman of that district. The road-bed has been considerably widened and a good grade has been made. The lane and road side has been cleared of rocks, trees and timbers and a clean and thorough job is being done by the workmen.

When the contract was let in the spring for this part of the market road construction it was planned to complete the road to the foot of Mapleton hill, to connect with the work of the forest department.

POSTPONE CELEBRATION
ROAD CONDITIONS RESULT IN CHAMBER ACTION

Event Planned for August 18 at Florence Indefinitely Held Over by Sluaw Organization

FLORENCE, Ore., July 27.—The board of directors of the Sluaw chamber of commerce at a special session Wednesday night, voted to postpone indefinitely the celebration which was to have been held on August 18th in Florence.

Considerable preparation had been made by the committees in charge, but owing to the action of the board it was deemed advisable to delay the celebration until the road conditions are less hazardous.

The action of the board came after receiving word that the forest road over Mapleton hill will not be completed by that date and that the only road open would be the river road between Mapleton and Florence. The river road is narrow with few turnouts and the board stated that the celebration idea would be laid aside until the road conditions are less hazardous.

A one-way traffic had been planned for the day with cars coming to Florence over one route returning home another. With the assurance of only one road being open the liability of accidents was too great, and the people of this community did not want accidents of perhaps serious nature to mar the festivities.

The idea of the celebration has not been done away with entirely, but the chamber is only awaiting the completion of a road which would not hamper travel to any extent. From all reports a great many people had planned to take their vacations at the time of the celebration and it is the regret of the chamber members that they could not go ahead with celebration plans.
