

DAMAGES ARE SOUGHT

\$25,000 ASKED FOR INJURIES TO W. J. STOW

Another Complaint Seeks \$600 for Accident in Which Hobart Hornberger, 9, Was Hurt

Two recent Pacific highway accidents resulted in damage suits filed in district court yesterday. The larger suit was for \$25,000 alleged damages sustained by W. J. Stow, Creswell, who is in a critical condition at the Pacific Christian hospital as a result of injuries received Saturday night when his wagon was struck by a car driven by George Fortune Motion, of British Columbia. A third car which figured in the accident did not stop, according to reports here. The complaint alleges that the plaintiff, while driving a team on the highway two miles south of Goshen, was thrown into the ditch when the defendant's car struck his wagon going at a rate of speed more than 25 miles an hour. It asserts that the defendant was negligent in that he attempted to drive between a northbound car and a southbound wagon. The other complaint was filed in behalf of Hobart Hornberger, 9, his guardian, Minnie Hornberger, against Arthur Merchan, for alleged damages of \$600. The complaint asserts that the boy sustained fractured bones in his hip and ankle as a result of being struck by the defendant's car on the Pacific highway. David B. Evans is attorney for the plaintiff in the Hornberger case, and Charles M. Hardy and S. M. Calkins are attorneys for Mr. Stow.

BANDIT STORY SCOUTED

POLICE THINK TRAIN HOLDUP NEVER OCCURRED

Charles Webber Questioned Here; Stories About Robbery Found to Vary

After investigation by local police and Southern Pacific authorities the report that two masked men held up passengers on a Southern Pacific train as it entered the city limits early Sunday morning was scouted. Information first received by police was that the holdup occurred on train No. 16. This was later found to be without foundation. Charles Webber, Portland, one of the men who reported the holdup, was questioned yesterday and is said to have told several conflicting stories. At one time he said that he had \$30 on him which the bandits overlooked. Another story was to the effect that he was dead broke. When questioned further it was found that Webber came into Eugene from the south on a freight train. Also, that he is a veteran of the late war and has been in the state hospital in California receiving treatment for lapse of memory. It is thought that the man told the story in an effort to arouse sympathy locally.

Final spurt. Cuhel, victim of a poor start, lost fully five yards before he was in his stride but closed fast enough to beat his teammate Taylor, whose usually flawless form over the timbers and stamina, were lacking.

Stars Lose in Tryouts

Warning of impending disaster to the American sprinters came at the very start of the day's program when Henry Russell, considered an outstanding favorite, and Claude Bracey, were eliminated in the semi-finals. Each finished fifth and Wykoss barely qualified, third taking in the second heat, which was won by Jack London, British negro, after McAllister buoyed American hopes by capturing the first heat, each winner tying the Olympic record of 10.3-5.

It was all the more surprising when, two hours later, in the final Williams swooped into the tape first in time 1-4 of a second slower, while London and the German dark horse, George Lammers finished ahead of Wykoff, and W. B. Legg, the South American, nosed out McAllister for fifth. Whatever chances the Americans had were ruined by two breaks—a false start by Wykoff, which apparently rattled the young American, and the mishap to McAllister, whose obvious leg-pull 30 meters from the tape, slipped the flying cop's wings, just when he needed them most.

Williams Springs Surprise

Williams, giving Canada its first Olympic sprint triumph since Bobby Kerr won the 200 meters 30 meters from the tape, clipped good enough to bring along. He had his own trainer with him but did not take practice seriously and was not regarded as a contender even by Dominion enthusiasts.

The Canadian's great victory contrasted with the worst setback Americans ever have received in the event, America now has yielded the 100 meter crown three times but never before did worse than second.

About the only solace the Yankees obtained out of the wreckage of some of their fondest hopes was the spectacular 800 meter running of Lloyd Hahn, who, in the toughest of three semi-finals, outran Phil Edwards of Canada and Sera Martin of France in 1 minute 55.3-5 seconds. Traveling three seconds faster than the winners of the other two heats, the Boston "express" thereby established himself as a favorite for tomorrow's final. Two other Yankees survive—Earl Fuller, who beat the champion,

Douglas Lowe, of England, and Ray Watson, who finished second to Hahn of Sweden.

Aside from Hahn's great running in which he was forced to come from behind to beat Edwards, the 500 meter sensation was furnished by elimination of the German favorite, Otto Peltzer.

Touton Shows Brief Flash

The Touton doctor showed only a brief flash of speed, wilted badly in the last 200 meters and finished fifth in a heat won by Fuller from Lowe by a yard. The fourth American, Johnny Sittig, was eliminated in the fifth, Hahn's heat.

Irishman vanquished Swede as O'Callaghan won the hammer throw from Oslan Skold, Stockholm policeman, by a four inch margin with a heave of 151.39 meters, the equivalent of 168 feet 7-1/2 inches. None of the Americans was up to form, Edmund Black taking third place, Donn Gwinn, fifth, and Frank Connors sixth.

The United States despite reversals, increased its lead in team scores through weight of numbers with a total of 53 points for six events. Others were Great Britain 19; Finland 17; Sweden 16; Canada and Ireland 10 each; Germany 9. France lost the one-point and Japan gained it by official revision of the high jump standing, placing Kimura of Japan sixth instead of Pierre Louven of France.

American girls participating in the first women's Olympic track and field events, fared little better than the men. Alone of the four who started in the 100 meters, Elizabeth Robinson surprised by qualifying for tomorrow's final, sharing the best semi-final time with Fanny Rosenfeld, Canadian, each 12-3-5 seconds. Three Canadians, two German lassies and Miss Robinson survived the field of feminine sprinters.

trade in connection with the saloon let us consider how Smith's vote protected them when he was in the legislature. We find him on April 26 and May 3, 1905, and April 3, 1906, voting against a bill which would permit local police officers to enter any questionable saloon law hotel at any hour it was open for business and which would have required building inspection for the abuses of such places, on all restrictive measures Smith's record is against restriction.

Referring to a bill in 1910 which would have restricted the number of saloon licenses to one for every 750 population, and regulated the operation of hotels, Mr. White says, the assembly records show that Governor Smith opposed the measure on its first vote, voted against reconsideration and voted against it the second time.

Opposed to Restrictions

"So, four times in two days Assemblyman Smith voted against restricting the number of licenses, voted against stipulating that prostitution be prohibited, voted against true name registration in hotels, voted in favor of permitting room to be rented repeatedly to different persons in the same night. His record answers the question as to his attitude as an Assemblyman towards restricting the liquor traffic. Can he still hold that he has not changed his mind since the record was made?" Smith as speaker favored Tammany, White said.

"It is inconceivable," he goes on, "that he has not changed his mind since he left the assembly. But the record is the record built in the days of his youth. It is no new thing in this state. His votes on these measures have been printed time and again in various New York elections and outside of the city of New York, generally, New York state people have voted overwhelmingly against Governor Smith and that record. He has lost on that record outside of the Metropolitan area time and again, no one believes—least of all do I believe—that Governor Smith today is the kind of man that made that assembly record. But Tammany would remake that record and make Smith remake it if it could.

Old Record Stands

"Governor Smith has done many splendid things since then. He has grown in power and grace, but the record stands. His answer to it should not be an alibi, and lacking repudiation the record stands as a foreshadowing portent of what may be expected from Governor Smith in the White House. A word from him, now that he has the nomination of a major party, would seem to be necessary at the outset in this campaign.

"I have tried to be exact and careful in setting down the record. But if errors typographical, or factual, have been made inadvertently, I shall be the first to acknowledge them."

AMUNDSEN PARTY LOST

SEARCH GIVEN UP BY NEWS-PAPER EXPEDITION

OSLO, Norway, July 30.—(AP)—Convicted that Rold Amundsen, Lieutenant Left Dietrichsen and their four French companions have perished, the Norwegian newspapers searching expedition is returning to Tromsø from the Spitzbergen area. With them is Captain Oscar Wisting, who was supply officer of the Amundsen rescue party. He, too, is persuaded that his erstwhile comrades are dead. French searchers, however, still hold hope of finding the missing plane. It was piloted by Commander Rene Gihaud with Lieut. Albert de Cuverville as relief pilot, Emil Valette as radio operator and Gilbert Brassy as mechanic. The countrymen of these missing adventurers refuse to give them up. Two additional French hydro-airplanes are to be joined to the search soon.

KILLED BY OWN WEAPON

E. J. ARRINGTON, RANGER, MEETS DEATH IN WILDS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 28.—(AP)—Shot by his own revolver as he stooped to drink from a pool on Larch mountain, about six miles from the Columbia river at Multnomah falls, E. J. Arrington, 80, a forest ranger, died today while being carried down a tortuous mountain trail in an ambulance. He was employed by the Crown Willamette Paper company.

It was at the last spring on the trail to the top of the mountain where a man and a woman found Arrington, lying as though asleep, about 7 a. m. today. Coming closer, they found blood streaming from his face. Arrington was unconscious and first aid helped him little. He died four hours later. In the pool a few feet from the spot where Arrington was found, his revolver was discovered with one shell empty. It is believed it was discharged when it fell from his holster onto a rock.

PORTLAND TO WELCOME OUTSIDE MERCHANTS

Many Hundreds Will Be Guests of Down-river City During Week of August 6-11

PORTLAND, July 30.—Portland has prepared as never before for welcome and entertainment of the many hundreds of merchants who will be the guests of the city, August 6-11, on the occasion of the Sixteenth Annual Buyers' week sponsored by the trade and commerce department of the Portland chamber of commerce.

Plans have been completed by special committees that have been working for weeks, that no detail looking to the comfort and pleasure of the visitors may be overlooked.

One hundred and ten Portland jobbers and manufacturers participating in buyers' week activities will display signs of uniform design at their places of business throughout the week, as a beacon of hospitality to visiting merchants.
