SCORPION STINGS MAN

RUBE MONTGOMERY VICTIM OF ODD EPISODE

LEABURG, Ore., July 31. — Rube Montgomery of Leaburg was recently stung on the hand by a scorpion, the first time any one has had that experience in this locality. Contrary to the general impression of the "deadly" scorpion, the small brown variety of about two to four inches in length, which is quite common throughout western Oregon, particularly along rocky ledges and south-western hillsides, the Oregon scorpion, is not "deadly". Its sting causing much less inflammation than that of a wasp or yellow-jacket, according to its size.

Mr. Montgomery, whose hand was swollen considerably for three or four days, was instructed by his doctor to relieve the pain and inflammation by binding on a 50-50 poultice of soda and epsom salts.

FOUR HURT IN ACCIDENT

SERIOUS CRASH AT HALSEY TAKES TOLL

HALSEY, Ore., July 31. — (Special to the Register) — An automobile accident in which four persons were more or less seriously injured and two cars well nigh demolished, occurred two miles south-west of Halsey about 8:30 o'clock last evening. Tom Palmer, son of Lyman Palmer of Lake Creek, and Wayne Klein of Corvallis were going south on the old highway and as they neared the E. D. Pierson home, a car driven by C. E. Ardary coming east from Lake Creek, and their car collided. Tom Palmer was driving the Klein car, and Mr. and Mrs. Ardary were in the other machine.

Both cars were turned over and stopped with the wheels in the air. The Star being some 60 feet from the intersection where the accident happened. Young Palmer was perhaps the most seriously injured, and was rendered unconscious for over an hour.
