

SMITH TO WAGE FIGHT IN CORN BELT SECTOR

Battle Lines Mapped Out in
Agricultural Terrain

WILL CONFER WITH PEEK

Farm Leader Has Been at Odds
With Administration Over
Relief For Tillers

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—(AP)—In fighting trim, Governor Smith returned today from a short vacation at the seashore to the main base of his campaign operations, determined, in mapping out battle lines, to give immediate attention to the corn belt sector.

Anxious to take advantage of any spirit of revolt against the Republicans on the part of the farmers of the west, the political lieutenants of the Democratic presidential nominees have arranged for him to confer here tomorrow with George N. Peek, of Illinois, one of the farm leaders who has been at odds with the administration on agricultural relief.

Smith disclosed the appointment, just before he left Hampton bays, on the south shore of Long Island, where since Saturday he had been taking it easy, swimming and golfing to his heart's content. He declined to be drawn out as to what might result from his talk with Peek, and said that he was quite sure he would have little to say about it afterward.

Peek heads Committee Republican, is chairman of the committee of twenty-two which for several years has been trying to get federal legislation along the lines of the vetted McNary-Haugen bill. He is a warm friend of Vice-President Dawes, and was in the Lowden camp during the pre-convention campaigns.

Since his nomination, the governor has kept mum on the farm question except to promise, in response to an inquiry from W. J. Ertle, president of the Indiana bureau federation, that if elected he would seek immediately the advice of a group of experts on the drafting of a definite legislative program for congress.

Conference is Arranged Governor Smith told newspapermen that he would see Peek here tomorrow just before the party set out by motor to New York from Canoe Place Inn. He started off a press conference under a big elm with the suggestion:

"Why don't you ask me if I'm going to see anyone in New York tomorrow?"

"Well, are you?" came a chorus.

"Yes, George N. Peek."

"It's to be assumed that you'll talk over the farm question?"

"Well, we'd hardly talk about golf," Smith came back.

It is regarded as certain that Smith while here will canvass the political situation with John J. Raskob, whom he has not seen since his friend became head of the Democratic national committee and others who are in charge of his campaign.

ROME CROWDS CHEER GROUP

ROME, July 31.—(AP)—General Umberto Nobile and his rescued comrades of the Italia disaster returned to Rome tonight while an immense crowd filled the air with cheers and women wept and threw flowers in their path.

They were received with almost royal honors by Prince Ludovico Potenziana, Governor of Rome, and other high officials in the room of the railway station reserved for the King and his family.

When they emerged in view of the multitude the crowd went wild and broke through the lines of police and carabinieri. It was some time before the men could get clear and start by automobiles to their homes.

SWATHS CUT BY FLAMES

BRUSH AND GRASS FIRES DESTROY 31 BUILDINGS

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1.—(AP)—U. S. forest service officials announced tonight that forest, brush, and grass fires had destroyed 31 buildings in the area bounded by Lake Tahoe, the Shasta national forest and the Monterey district during the past 24 hours.

In addition, the flames swept 4500 acres of cut-over land, and burned some valuable timber, officials said the fires were under control at present, but might break out again if the wind rose.

Foresters reported burning of 20 buildings in the Crown-Willamette paper company's camp No. 4, three miles north of Tahoe city, the fire ran over 500 acres and destroyed 10,000 cords of pulp.

"He may not be in my string, but I have three men from Texas who are known down there as great fighters and three more from North Carolina. From out of the unknown somewhere will come a man who will who the Rickards, Sharkey, Heeney and Paulinos who have failed so often."

Rickard accepted the nomination of the 50 entries and asked only that Jimmy get more if possible.
