

SAYS FEE CLAUSE SOUND

JOHN RASKOB MAKES STUDY OF AID PROVISION

He Favors Plan of This Sort in Democratic Proposal For Relief of Farmer

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—(AP)—John Raskob, Democratic national chairman, today said after a preliminary study of the equalization fee for farm relief, he had failed to find that it is economically unsound.

Something of the sort he said, might be included in the Democratic plan for farm relief. The McNary-Haugen farm bill, carrying the equalization fee, was vetoed by President Coolidge.

The party would set about at once, the Democratic chairman said, in formulating a constructive farm relief plan, and not wait until after the November elections.

Governor Smith in a recent telegram to a western farm leader said if he were elected he would seek the best advice available in drawing up a farm relief program for presentation to congress immediately after inauguration.

Raskob confers with Peck. Raskob yesterday conferred for four hours with George Nelson Peck of Moline, Ill., head of the farm belt committee of 32 that fought unsuccessfully for the McNary-Haugen bill.

When apprised of the Raskob statement, Senator George Moses of New Hampshire, Hoover eastern states manager, said:

"If Mr. Raskob has been converted to the equalization fee, he is a brand plucked from the burning. I can't think of anything more revolutionary from a man with his background."

Peck and Governor Smith are to meet tomorrow.

Senator Moses left today for the Dublin, New Hampshire, home of George Harvey, former ambassador to England, for a conference. From there he will go to Chicago for the regional Republican conference Saturday.

sturdy German from, Lina Radke, in world's record time as all six point winners, including the American girl, bettered the former mark. Frau Radke's time was 2 minutes 14.4 seconds, more than 2 seconds faster than her own former world's record.

The United States, adding only 5 points to its men's team score, still holds a commanding lead with 128 1/2, but Finland served notice it is ready to make a strong finish by moving up to second place with 48, displacing Britain whose total after 15 events is now 47.

Finland's javelin throwers, including Eino Penttila, world's record holder, suffered setbacks at the hands of the young Swede, but Larva and his teammate Eino Poire put on a spectacular 1500 meter act to even matters.

Finish Strategy Works. Finnish strategy worked perfectly. The Frenchman ran himself out in a premature spurt while the long striding Larva, came bounding on to win by three yards. Larva barely had enough to spare of Poire's bid for second place. Con- sidering the rear guard all the way, had nothing like his customary spurt and finished tenth.

The rest of the day's story included little for Americans to cheer about. Barbuil, running strongly, was clocked in the second best 400 meter time, 48.4-5 seconds, the German Joachim Buchner doing 48.3-5. Phillips won two heats in better than 50 seconds but Tierney and Snider faltered badly and were eliminated after winning their first trials.

Cassey Averts a Rout. Cassey saved the Yankee triple-jumpers from rout and came within less than 2 inches of the winner Oda. None of the other three Americans, Lloyd Bourgeois, Sidney Bowman and Bob Kelley, got beyond the first trials. The javelin throwers were more completely outclassed by a great European field. Arthur Sager, best of the Americans, was just short of 50 meters, while the great European, Charles Harlow, Crath Hines and Lee Bartlett were eliminated in the preliminaries where Lundquist, who won the event, broke the record with his very first throw.

DELPHIN DELMAS PASSES

ATTORNEY DEFENDED HARRY K. THAW IN TRIAL

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Delphin M. Delmas, who died today at Santa Monica, California, came out of the west twenty years ago, to act as chief of counsel for Harry K. Thaw, when Thaw was on trial as the slayer of Stanford White.

Jurists still recall his summation to the jury in that trial, when he coined the phrase "dementia Americana," to describe the species of insanity he contended his client suffered.

"I care not whether you give it a name," he told the jury in describing Thaw's affliction. "But it is a species of insanity which is recognized in every state of the union. It is a species which may be labelled, and which I label 'dementia Americana.'"

SPRAYED BY BURNING OIL

ONE MAN DIES, 55 OTHERS ARE HURT IN STILL BLAST

LAWRENCEVILLE, Ill., Aug. 1.—(AP)—Explosion of an old steam oil still at the Indian refinery here today caused the death of one man and injured 55 others, nine seriously.

The blast occurred while the refinery's volunteer fire brigade was fighting a small blaze at the still and drenched almost three score of them in burning oil.

The explosion occurred without warning. Burning oil spouted 100 feet upward through a man hole of the still. The blasting oil sprayed down upon the fire fighters who had no chance to save themselves.

Jack Fresse, 45, refinery employe, father of two children, died of his burns, and the lives of nine other men were despaired of by physicians.

Of the 55 burned, 27 were sent to hospitals.

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markets, while a year or so later one of his bureau chiefs attempted to deny that Mr. Hoover ever had made such recommendations.

Facts Sought in Senate. "All of these incidents and more have been referred to in the United States senate and Mr. Hoover was invited to join in a request for an investigation of the facts in order that the country might know the truth about his record as a friend of the American farmer as distinguished from the propaganda on his behalf to capture the farm vote. But Mr. Hoover maintained a discreet silence. He may claim he held down prices of farm products in the temporary interests of consumers, but he can hardly persuade the farmers that such a benign activity was in their interest.

"It stands to reason I think that in the face of such a record he will find it difficult to persuade the farmers that his campaign promises he may now make can be relied upon or will be carried out by him in the event of his election."

BORDER TROUBLES FLARE

TROOP MOVEMENTS OF LITHUANIANS ARE NOTED

WARSAW, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Airming reports were published in Warsaw newspapers today from the Lithuanian border relating to the continual occurrence of frontier incidents such as the destruction of boundary posts and exchanges of shots.

The reports say that considerable movements of Lithuanian troops just across the border have been noticed in the past few days.

Carried with them is the news of the explosion of a powder magazine at a Lithuanian border post last night in which a number of soldiers were reported killed and wounded.

The newspapers in commenting on the report expressed apprehension as to Lithuanian future action.

76-Year-Old Tries Flying;

Says She Likes It

Mrs. B. G. Allen, of Palo Alto, Says Plane Is Nothing to Frighten One.

BY CONSTANCE HUTCHCOCK. "I'm nearer seventy-six than fifty," confesses Mrs. B. G. Allen, of Palo Alto, who is Eugene to visit her brother, L. C. Ables, "and I'm the first member of my family to fly."

Mrs. Allen went up last week with her own nephew, Willard Ables, of Longview, Wash., as pilot. "I've wanted to fly for years," she said yesterday, "but my family thought it would be very foolish. In fact I'm the first one of all to go up, and they don't know it yet. I believe in trying everything new. If you don't like it, you don't have to do it again and you're not hurt."

"Why, I can remember when the first trials came into San Jose people thought it was just as wild. They said goodbye to their friends just as though they never expected to see them again."

When asked if she was a bit afraid, she answered quite scornfully: "Afraid, why goodness no, there's nothing to be afraid of. I just thought it was thrilling, and when I got up over the town and looked up and down that lovely river, I just said, what a beautiful world it is."

"The only trouble I had at all was getting in," she continued. "You see I was injured by a fall some years ago and can only use one leg, and when they said: Aunt Hattie, we don't think you can make it, I said 'I surely can if you can. I've got one good leg and I'm not going to do a foot race. I'm going to fly.'"

"Oh, I'm not going to tell them anything about it at home till I get them all together in a sort of family reunion, and then I'm going to announce to them that I'm the first one of them all to fly and see what they say to that."
