

LANE VETS TAKE BIG PART IN CONVENTION

George E. Love, Retiring Commander, Is Honored

GEORGE DISTRICT HEAD

Drum Corps Makes Good Showing at Annual Conclave of Legion Held at Medford

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 4.—(Special to the Register)—S. S. George of Eugene, former commander of the Eugene Legion Post No. 3, was unanimously elected committee chairman of the annual state American Legion convention here today.

George served as chairman of the committee on committees, the most important appointive post. Eugene and Lane county fared well at the conclave. George Love, member of the local post, presided as state commander, concluding a year of activity which brought the Legion to its highest pinnacle in its 10 years of existence. As Commander Love handed the gavel to new commander, Ben Fisher of Marshfield, it marked the progress of a year of tremendous progress for the Legion. Under the love, the Legion has shown the largest membership in its entire history. Commander Love was presented with a gavel by the 40 and 8 organization, Whitcomb Post of Corvallis, and a silver life membership card from the Eugene post. It marked only the second time in the history of the Legion that a life membership had been granted to a state Legionnaire. In addition to that, he was presented with a shield gold past commanders' badge from the department of Oregon by the incoming state commander, Fisher.

Dorris Named Delegate
Ben Dorris, another Eugene man, and member of the state game commission, was unanimously elected a delegate to the national convention. Mr. Dorris also served on the important finance committee.

Lane county more than received its share of representation on the various committees. Besides Dorris and George, who served on two important committees, Dr. Del Stannard, past commander of the Eugene post, was chairman of the welfare committee.

Other Lane county committee-men were: Duncan P. Cameron of Cottage Grove, Americanization committee; B. H. Huntley of Springfield, land committee; Sam Wilderman, Eugene, publicity committee; La Salle Stewart, Cottage Grove, state aid; Lieut. George F. Herbert, Eugene, resolutions; Jack Larson, Springfield, post activities; and Senator E. F. Bailey, Junction City, alternate on the constitutional amendments committee. Comrade Cameron received an added honor when he was unanimously elected state chaplain, after he was nominated by Mr. George.

Grove Team Wins
The Cottage Grove post beat out the Eugene post by 1-32 of a point as the most military appearing organization in the entire drum and bugle corps competition.

Neal Morfit of Astoria, former University of Oregon football star, was unanimously chosen grand chief of the 40 and 8 organization. This office places him at the head of the state fun order for the coming year.

The Lane county vote, No. 30 of the 40 and 8 society, put on the annual initiatory ceremony Friday at which members from all over the state were admitted. The local press said it was the most successful initiation ever held in the state. The following members of the Lane county vote participated in the degree work: M. L. May, chief of the 40 and 8; H. G. Campbell, correspondent; Howard Freeland, conductor; George Mifflin, J. O. Davis, Dr. Delbert Stannard, Lieut. George F. Herbert, Con Dillon, James Pieren, Cliff Crutson, Ben Dorris, Pete Nelson, Ray Vinson, George Hukovsky and W. H. Williams.

Among the Eugene spectators were Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Love, parents of Commander George Love, Mrs. Wallace W. Winter, Mrs. Clint Cherm, Mrs. S. S. George, Mrs. George Dorris, Mrs. Virgil Key, Mrs. Giffey Campbell.

Vincent Gets Honor
Russell Vincent, drum major of the Eugene post, was one of four who tied for first prize in the drum and bugle corps competition. A judge was induced to settle the tie and he awarded the cup to Roy O. Williams of La Grande, a former University of Oregon student.

W. L. May of Eugene was ordered a solid gold American Legion pin for getting third honors in the individual membership contest. Mr. May induced 100 members to sign for the year of 1929. He also was made chairman of the important resolutions committee of the 40 and 8 organization. Howard Freeland, also of Eugene, was put on the community service committee. The four Eugene delegates to the 40 and 8 conclave were Mr. May, Mr. Freeland, James Pieren and Giffey Campbell. The Eugene post won the \$1000 Whippet car in the contest sponsored by the Pacific Legion official publication of the state Legion department.

Eugene also placed second in the stunt contest, with first honors going to the Salem post.

Among the prominent editors who spoke at the conclave was R. G. Calvert, managing editor of the Oregonian, Sergeant Earl R. Goodwin, Portland, newspaperman, was elected delegate to the national convention, while Thomas E. Shea, editor of the Portland News, was honored with a newly created position in the grand volume, 40 and 8.

S. S. while Major Philip L. Jackson, member of the board of regents of the University of Oregon, was named first alternate to the national convention.

The Eugene delegation was headed by Ben Dorris and include Mr. May, Con Dillon, commander, Eugene Post No. 3, Mr. Wilderman, Dr. Stannard, Lieutenant Herbert, and Mr. George.

POLISH ARMEN MAY HAVE MET DISASTER

Plane Marsalek Pilsudski entered the emergency phase tonight, as the long haul entered the forecast hour, meager dispatches received from vessels at sea telling of the sailing of a plane, presumably the Polish one, suggested the possibility that the machine may have turned back toward Europe or have been lost in the Atlantic.

The Norwegian tank ship Amakura reported by wireless that she had sighted a plane, presumably the Marsalek Pilsudski, at 2:40 a. m. Greenwich Meridian time, in latitude 44:22 north and longitude 24:08 west. This would place the Polish airmen about 200 miles north of the Azores at that hour.

The Amakura also reported that the plane, which encircled the ship at a distance of half a mile, "approached from the westward" and disappeared northward, flying very fast.

Placed Nearer Europe
At 5 a. m. (G.M.T.) the British steamship Amakura reported sighting a plane, also apparently the Marsalek Pilsudski, in latitude 46:20 north and longitude 20:42 west. This position placed the Polish plane almost four degrees or several hundred miles nearer Europe, two hours and twenty minutes after being sighted by the Amakura.

The Amakura also reported that the plane, which encircled the ship at a distance of half a mile, "approached from the westward" and disappeared northward, flying very fast.

The Polish airmen, Majors Louis Idzikowski and Kasimir Kubala, carried no radio and ship reports consequently afforded the only means of determining the plane's position and the direction in which she was flying.

Should Arrive by Dusk
Should the positions given by the two ships prove erroneous and the plane be in full flight for the United States, it should reach the North American coast by dusk.

If the Polish fliers turned their course back toward Europe, they should have reached the European coast at least by noon, eastern standard time, today. No word was received concerning them during the day and this led to the added belief that their compass may have failed them and that they were flying in a great circle.

Another possibility was that the fliers turned in a northeasterly direction in order to skirt an extensive storm area.

The plane carried enough gasoline under normal conditions to remain in the air for 56 hours, which would give the fliers until 8:46 a. m. Sunday (eastern standard time) before a descent would become necessary.

NEON DECISION UPHOLD

COURT PROCEEDINGS THREATENED UNLESS INFRINGEMENTS UPON PATENTS IS STOPPED

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 4.—According to a telegram received here this week from Los Angeles by James C. Zankler, vice-president of the Electrical Products Corporation, manufacturers of Neon signs, the company is now serving notice on all Neon lighting manufacturers calling their attention to the July 2 decisions of the United States court of appeals sustaining the Claude Neon patent granted on June 10, 1915. Manufacturers are informed that unless they desist from manufacturing, selling, using or servicing infringing Neon lighting the company will consider such infringements intentional and institute court proceedings.

Paul D. Howie, president of Electrical Products corporation of California and Arizona, says: "I am informed by our attorneys, not only in New York but in Chicago and Los Angeles, that the decision of July 2 is a clear one, final and not subject to appeal. The court finds that Claude was the originator and inventor of the Neon industry and that his patent was regularly and properly granted. The Electrical Products corporation, since the fall of 1925, has consistently and regularly advertised the fact that it was the sole licensee under the Claude patent, and has so informed not only manufacturers but users of Neon lighting, through the press and the mails.

"Our attorneys are preparing for injunction proceedings against those manufacturers who do not immediately cease infringement and make registration for violation. The first action against the manufacturers on the Pacific coast will be in Los Angeles, Portland, Seattle, Denver and Salt Lake City, in turn, as well as against a number which have sprung up in other cities in the Pacific coast territories.

"The policy of the Electrical Products corporation has been to lease Neon lighting and assume the care and maintenance of the same to the highest efficiency and this policy will continue."

Scottish Fancies. Beat 1 egg until light, add 1/2 cup sugar, 2-3 tsp. melted shortening, 1 cup rolled oats, 1-3 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. vanilla. Drop by teaspoonful on greased tin. Bake in a moderate oven until brown.

Don't envy your neighbor her leisure time, her springy step or her pretty well-kept hands. If you would follow her example and send your clothes to the New Service Laundry, you, too, would have attractive-looking. Make a cottage pudding, but before baking cover top with quartered peaches. Sprinkle with sugar and bake in a moderate oven.

While the market is full of vegetables why not can some for future use in soup? Select a wide variety of vegetables. Wash and boil separately from 3 to 5 minutes. Then pare, scrape and string them. Cut into suitable size. Mix. To 1 full quart of vegetables add 1 tsp. salt and fill with boiling water. Boil in jars for 5 hours.

This helps greatly in economizing on gas or electricity.

Surprise Meat Balls. To 1 pound ground steak add 1/2 cup grated cheese, juice of 1 lemon, 1/2 green pepper chopped, 2 table-spoons green olives minced, 1 tsp.

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chopped pimiento, 1 tsp. salt, 1 cup bread crumbs, 1 egg and 1/2 cup milk. Shape into balls and fashion pieces of bacon around with a toothpick. Bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes.

The canning season is on in full swing. All housewives are busy filling shelves with canned fruit, jams and jellies to be used this winter. At Underwood and Elliott Grocery, 15th and Patterson, they say this is the best time to can peaches. The lovely Elberta peach is now at the bottom price and of the highest quality. Tender little loafs are ready to be pickled. Blackberries, Himalayas and Lawtons, are also in the market for canning.

Scale 1 1/2 cups milk, add 1 tbsp. dissolved gelatine and pour onto 2 egg yolks mixed with 1/4 cup sugar and 1-8 tsp. salt. Put in double boiler and cook until it thickens. Strain and cool. When it begins to stiffen beat until light and add 3 stiffly beaten egg whites. Garnish a mold with peaches, apricots

or plums and fill with alternate layers of custard and fruit. Chill.
