Mr. and Mrs. George H. Applegate Honored at Celebration Held in Yoncalla Valley Sunday.

DRAIN, Ore., Aug. 4.—(Special to the Register)—Mr. and Mrs. George Applegate celebrated the 50th anniversary of their marriage Sunday, July 29 at their home in Yoncalla valley. Their home is the show place of Yoncalla, being the old donation claim which Mr. Applegate's father, Charles Applegate, purchased in an early day.

Mr. Applegate is a native of Oregon. He is the only surviving member of the family of Charles Applegate, who was one of the three brothers who emigrated to Oregon in 1843. The Applegate Emigration company was the first wagon train to cross the plains and finally reach Oregon. Mrs. Applegate came to Oregon from Nebraska where she was engaged in teaching.

The couple had five children, all of whom were present at the celebration. They are Mrs. E. A. Kuley of Portland, Misses Eva and Evva Applegate of Portland, Vincent Applegate of Sutherlin and Paul Applegate of Yoncalla.

More than three hundred adults and children registered at the celebration to pay homage to one of the best loved couples in this community.
