MOVIE MAN DISCUSSES FUTURE EUGENE PLANS

Talking Pictures Possible Only on 7-Day Schedule

COSTS EXTREMELY HIGH

M. H. Newman, Theatre Supervisor and General Manager of the Northwest, Visits in Eugene

Making a survey of Universal theatres on the coast, M. H. Newman, northwest general manager and coast supervisor of theatres, spent several days in Eugene the past week conferring with Russell F. Brown, local manager of the McDonald and Rex, regarding the future policies for entertainment here.

Nearly every first class theatre in the country will be equipped with "talking pictures." Movietone and Vitaphone, within the next six or eight months, according to Mr. Newman, who is a veteran showman, having been associated with Universal for many years, following his great success in the organization of the Grauman theatres in Los Angeles and Hollywood several years ago.

When questioned regarding the possibility of the "talkies," as the movies with human speaking sequences synchronized with the action of the actors are now termed, being presented in Eugene, Mr. Newman was quite concerned. "The cost of installing the necessary equipment for either Movietone or Vitaphone is almost beyond belief," he declared.

Survey Made

"Universal has already deposited several hundred thousand dollars for the installation of talking pictures in its theatres throughout the country. We have taken a thorough survey of all cities in which we are operating theatres, and find that the extremely high cost in making such installations in a city the size of Eugene, under present conditions which permit the theatres but six days in which to operate, made it unadvisable to install Movietone or Vitaphone at this time.

"If, however, the Sunday opening bill passes, I can assure Eugene that Universal will install 'talking pictures' in the McDonald within 10 days, and provide the same modern class of entertainment here that every leading city now has, or will have in a few months," stated Mr. Newman, who outlined in every detail the reason for the high cost of talking equipment, such as patents, royalties, upkeep and operation, in addition to the initial cost of the equipment and the fact that film rentals would be tripled for "sound movies."

Picture Taken

Motion pictures of Mr. Newman's arrival were taken by Don Isham, who is here filming the McDonald Better Babies contest, and the pictures will be shown on the McDonald screen next week. The Universal executive was met here by his wife, who motored up from Los Angeles where Mr. Newman has been conferring with Carl Laemmle, president of Universal Pictures, regarding synchronized movies, returning here by rail. Mr. Laemmle agreed with Mr. Newman that the installation of 'talking pictures' was far too expensive to make in either Eugene or Corvallis, unless these cities, which are the only ones in the Universal chain closed on Sunday, were operated seven days a week.

Mr. and Mrs. Newman motored to Portland, enroute to Seattle, where the general manager will supervise the installation of Vitaphone in one of the Universal houses there.
