

TROPICAL STORM BLOWS BACK TOWARD ATLANTIC

Whimsically Changes Course After Entering Gulf

FLORIDA DAMAGE HEAVY

Half of Grapefruit Crop Lost And Oranges Were Damaged 20 Per Cent by Storm

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 10.—(AP)—Whimsically changing its course after entering the Gulf of Mexico, the tropical storm which struck the south central Florida mainland 8 days ago was in southern Georgia tonight blowing back toward the Atlantic ocean.

Gales and drenching rains caused minor damage to southern Georgia cities and towns. In Florida, an extensive territory back of Fort Pierce and surrounding the Lake Okechobee district was inundated, with families marooned and little direct news of Tuesday night's storm.

Estimates of the damage in Florida varied but the citrus industry was known to have suffered heavily in sections especially in St. Lucie county where the Florida citrus exchange estimated a 50 per cent loss in grapefruit and 20 per cent in oranges. Around Kissimmee, inland some fifty miles from Fort Pierce, half the grapefruit was lost and oranges were damaged 20 per cent. Other points in the area reported citrus losses varying from 5 to 40 per cent.

Flying Boat Is Missing Reports from outlying districts that four or five persons had been killed remained unconfirmed, but nothing has been heard from a flying boat which left Nassau, Bahamas, Wednesday for Miami, with two men aboard. Little hope was held for their safety although aviators said the plane may have sought shelter on some isolated island.

While the flood waters around Lake Okechobee were receding tonight, some threat remained at a power dam near Inlet, Fla. If a change in wind caused the water to pile against the dam, officials said they would be compelled to open flood gates probably inundating a wide section between that place and the gulf 15 miles away.

Fifty Persons Marooned A Palm Beach Red Cross unit today succeeded in reaching fifty marooned persons at Hull Grove, five miles west of Jupiter.

Thomasville, Valdosta, Moultrie, and smaller communities were the places affected by the blow last night in Georgia.

Belen college observatory in Havana, Cuba, reported that the second tropical disturbance, of considerable intensity, now central southeast of Jamaica, likely would confine itself to the Caribbean sea. The storm was moving west-northwest and it was not believed it would reach to the northwest and toward the American mainland.

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 10.—(AP)—A vast sheet of flood waters, 25 miles wide in places and of undetermined length, lay tonight in the everglades lowlands west of Fort Pierce and around the eastern and northern shores of Lake Okechobee as a result of torrential rains accompanying the West Indian hurricane.

Within the expanse were many marooned families, thousands of acres of fertile tilled lands, citrus groves and settlements. Definite news from many communities awaited the recession of waters. Highways, for the most part still were blocked by washouts or overflows and the few caravans which have emerged or entered have done so under difficulties.

Okechobee City Damaged Okechobee city, with about 1200 population, was the largest affected town. Storm damage to the city was estimated at many thousands of dollars.

Efforts to reach Indian towns, where two men were reported killed, were unavailing as the highway to that place, 20 miles southeast of Okechobee, was impassable and the railroad out of service. Water was said to be four feet deep in the town.

Fifty persons were marooned at Bulls Grove, five miles west of Jupiter, when the Lomahatchee river rose and swirled over the country for miles.

The American battled gamely to hold his rangy rival in the first half but tired and was decisively whipped in the last 1000 meters.

The American double scullers, the veteran Costello and McIlvaine, not only outclassed the Canadians, Wright and Guest, but broke their own course record by winning in 6:41 2-5. Their previous mark was 6:43 3-5.

Penn Barge Club Four without coxswain lost to the British in the most exciting finish. The Americans led for 1500 meters but were unable to stand off the spurt of the British quartet from Trinity College, Cambridge, who won by a single second, barely half a length.

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WOMAN KILLED BY BLOW

MRS. D. H. BROWN OF TUX- WILA HIT BY TAXI DRIVER

Tragedy Occurs in an Altercation Over Parking Space on a Crowded Parking Lot

SEATTLE, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Mrs. D. H. Brown of Tukwila, Wash., died "of a cerebral hemorrhage, brought on by some form of violence applied to the head," Chief Deputy Coroner Willis H. Corson reported tonight after a post mortem.

Glenn Alvin Rouse, 31, taxi driver, held in jail on an open charge, admitted that he might have struck the woman with his fist last night in an altercation over parking space on a crowded parking lot.

Stories of witnesses vary as to just what happened. They all agree that the trouble started when Rouse began backing his machine into a parking space on a carnival lot at the same time as Frances Salinovich, with whom the Browns were riding, tried to drive into the place.

Driver Struck by Brown Rouse, his mother and his cousin, who accompanied him, told officers that Brown then climbed on the running board of their car and in an argument struck Rouse on the jaw. Rouse got out of his machine, and he said, several bystanders came to Brown's assistance. During the melee which followed he said he might have hit Mrs. Brown.

Officers said that most witnesses of the affair said nobody touched Rouse except Brown until after the taxi driver had hit Mrs. Brown.

Brown's story was that Rouse hit him first and that when he retaliated, the youth swung at either him or his wife, hitting his wife on the right temple and knocking her unconscious.

WOMAN KILLS HER RIVAL

MRS. LOGAN PERKINS SHOOT PEARL OWENS TO DEATH

Kentucky Tragedy Occurs When Wife Enters Train and Shoots Companion of Husband

SOMERSET, Ky., Aug. 10.—(AP)—Mrs. Logan Perkins, 27, of Whitley City, wife of a McCreary county, Kentucky, circuit clerk, was in jail facing a charge of murder here today after having shot to death a woman who she charged with breaking up her home.

Shortly after midnight, Mrs. Perkins walked down the aisle of a southbound Southern passenger train as it was passing Ferguson, two miles south of here, stopped behind a seat where her husband was talking with Miss Pearl Owens, 27, of Louisville, and fired twice, killing Miss Owens instantly.

While passengers in the day coach scrambled for safety, conductor Dan Demeen snatched the pistol from Mrs. Perkins' hand before she had an opportunity to fire again. She was placed under arrest and taken to a hospital where it was said she was in a state of nervous collapse. She will be arraigned at a preliminary hearing tomorrow.

Perkins, who said she had boarded the train at Somerset and had taken a seat beside Miss Owens with whom she was acquainted, declared that his wife was jealous. He said he had made no appointment to meet Miss Owens.

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CROATIA IN MOURNING

BODY OF RADITCH VIEWED BY WEeping PEASANTS

Mrs. Raditch Refuses to Accept Condolences Tendered by the Belgrade Government

ZAGREB, Jugo-Slavia, Aug. 10.—(AP)—An endless train of weeping mourners today and tonight passed by the body of Stefan Raditch, Croatian peasant leader, as it rested on a catafalque in the headquarters of the peasant party. Preparations are being made to receive 300,000 persons from all over the country to attend the funeral on Sunday.

Telegrams of condolence are continually arriving from many parts of the world and among them have been numerous expressions of sympathy from the United States.

Although there has been no untoward incident, the bitterness of feeling between the races which make up the kingdom has been shown in several incidents. Mrs. Raditch has refused to accept the messages of condolence offered by the Belgrade government.

Papers Burned in Square

Austrian newspapers were seized and burned in the square at Jellic, which this evening when it was discovered they contained a picture of Raditch wearing the Serbian headgear. The Croats said that Raditch had never donned the Serbian cap. The Vienna newspapers say, however, that Raditch, elated at the unification of Croatia and Serbia directly after the war, put on the Serbian national cap and was photographed while wearing it.

BALLOT FRAUDS ALLEGED

VICTORY IS CLAIMED FOR NATHAN FRANK, WET

Candidate is Advised that Wholesale Frauds Were Practiced in Kansas City Polls

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 10.—(AP)—David M. Proctor, dry candidate who ran third in the Republican senatorial primary race, tonight wired Nathan Frank, wet, who placed second, that "wholesale frauds" were practiced in Kansas City in the election and that Frank is "in fact and in law the Republican senatorial nominee."

Frank was defeated by Rescoe C. Patterson of Springfield, a dry, by a plurality of 7,156 votes in return from 3,552 precincts out of 4,143. The vote was Patterson 29,266, Frank 22,050, and Proctor 10,768.

Switched Ballot Returns Proctor, who is in San Antonio, Texas, charged that the Kansas City Democratic machine, the Republican election and police ma-

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chinery and "a certain newspaper," stole from Frank and from himself 10,000 votes and "literally gave an equal number in a lump to Patterson."

Proctor's telegram to Frank said: "To accomplish this miscarriage, many methods were employed, but the commonest was the certifying of votes which were not cast at all. I am reliably informed that in one precinct, five hundred and twenty-five votes were certified, yet only fifty human beings entered the polling place during the entire day."

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 10.—(AP)—A complete investigation of alleged irregularities in the state primary election here Tuesday will be made if the official count of ballots indicates dishonesty. Dr. Frank B. Miller, chairman of the election commissioners of Kansas City said tonight.

If specific charges are presented to the board, it will conduct an investigation, he said.
