It is not uncommon for this little "iron man" to shoot 75 or 100 shots at one lighting, but they range generally from 25 to 50 shots regularly, and that has been his pace since the first of May of this year. In fact Vint Lyons and his son, Guy, were the first men to begin work on this project.

Technically speaking the "man behind the gun" is the superintendent of all the work, but practically speaking, in this particular case, the "man behind the gun" is the gunner, or the person who has charge of blowing all the stumps off the right of way, that is being cleared through the McKenzia valley, that will eventually be diverted from a rugged cut over forest, into a beautiful canal, that will carry the water over a distance of five miles, to the power house where it will serve to grind out 22,000 horsepower of electricity.
