

WOMEN CAST BIG VOTE IN ARKANSAS PRIMARY

Total Poll in Democratic Balloting is Record

LONG TICKET IS TEDIOUS

It is Claimed That the Heavy Feminine Vote Would Determine Outcome of Races

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Activity of women voters in the Arkansas state Democratic primary today swelled the total vote to a figure believed to have exceeded the 212,000 cast in primary two years ago and to have approached a record established a few years ago when the Ku Klux Klan was a dominant issue in the state.

Nominees were selected for state district and county offices with the nomination equivalent to election to all state and district offices. Some candidates claimed the heavy feminine vote would determine the outcome in some races, notably that for governor in which there were seven candidates. Reports from over the state generally indicated comparatively few voters were challenged by election officials for their refusal to pledge support to the party's presidential nominees, Alfred E. Smith and Joseph T. Robinson.

Few Pledges Required Party officials in some counties had announced voters would be required to pledge support of the national ticket but indications were the rule followed in most places was to challenge only those Democrats who had been especially outspoken in their opposition to the national ticket.

One of the longest tickets on record in the state greatly delayed the reporting of returns.

The most important candidates for governor were Governor Harvey Parnell, who as a lieutenant governor became chief executive when Governor John E. McNamee was named a federal judge, and a few months ago and who made his campaign largely on the claim a change in that office at this time would end the state's present road program; J. Carroll Cone, state auditor; E. H. Hays, 30-year-old attorney and Tom J. Terrill, former "no pardon" governor, who in this campaign declared his policy against pardons had been too severe. The other gubernatorial candidates were Ben J. Griffin, R. F. Mason and J. R. Venable.

Five of the six incumbent congressmen seeking re-election had opposition. Otis Wingo of the fourth district was re-elected without a contest and John N. Tillman of the third was not a candidate.

LONELY CABIN IS TOMB

JOHN HORNBY AND NEPHEWS PERISH UP NORTH

Bodies Found on Bank of Long River in Hudson Bay; Died of Starvation

OTTAWA, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The Hudson Bay country—home to John Hornby, explorer—has taken his life.

The bodies of Hornby and his two nephews have been found in a cabin on the north bank of the Long River west of Hudson Bay. Canadian mounted police at Chesterfield Inlet, on the bay, reported by wireless today.

The three died of starvation in a barren land where the fate of travelers depends on plentifulness of caribou. In 1926, when the three set out in a canoe for Chesterfield Inlet, and in 1927, caribou were known to have been scarce.

Hornby and his nephews set out from Fort Reliance at the eastern end of Great Slave lake and an Indian reported seeing them late in 1928. Trappers brought out last word of the party. A note, written in 1926 and found at an abandoned camp, read: "Traveling slowly. Flies bad. Shot a buck caribou. Hope to see you down the Hanbury River this winter."

Never Survived Winter The party apparently never survived the winter. Their bodies were found in a cabin below the junction of the Hanbury and Long rivers and about 300 miles west of Chesterfield.

A search for them had been in progress since 1927. Hornby was born in Lancashire, England, in 1878. From 1909 until the war he made numerous journeys into the Hudson Bay country and was generally credited with knowing as much about it as any one in the world. He fought two years in the war and later resumed his explorations in the north country that he loved.

Coming Resigns Place Almost as an afterthought, the governor announced that Lieutenant Governor Edwin Corning, who is ill in Maine, had forwarded to him his resignation as chairman of the New York state Democratic committee, to which will fall the task of directing the campaign this fall on behalf of the party's state ticket. It was explained that Corning's retirement was due entirely to his illness.

As he bated with newspapermen prior to receiving a call late in the day from Senator Carter Glass of Virginia, the presidential nominee disclosed that Norman H. Davis of New York, who as a Democrat served as an assistant secretary of the treasury and as secretary of state during the Wilson administration, had stepped off for a morning call on his way home from Stockholm, Mass.

The governor also reported that he had spent part of the morning checking over gaily proofs of his completed acceptance speech, which will be delivered here a week from tomorrow night and made known his intention of making his annual visit to the New York state fair at Syracuse regardless of what demands may be made on him as a presidential candidate.
