

ORCHARDIST FORCED BY GUNMAN TO PUNGE \$500

At Graf Compelled to Withdraw Money from Bank

DRIVEN TO VANCOUVER

Wife of Hood River Man Held as Hostage Under Penalty Of Death by Thief

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Aug. 15.—(AP)—A hooded gunman, threatening the life of a woman, forced her husband to withdraw \$500 from the bank and drive to Vancouver, B. C., where the gunman threatened to kill the woman if the money was not delivered.

The gunman, who was dressed in a dark suit and a hood, drove to the home of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Graf, a well-known hood river farmer, and demanded the money. The woman, who was held as a hostage, was threatened with death if the money was not delivered.

Recognized As Convict
Mr. and Mrs. Graf examined a number of photographs in the county jail, and finally recognized a man who had been in the county jail for a number of years as the man who had demanded the money.

During the day, the gunman told Mrs. Graf his last crime was 600 miles from Hood River, and that five men took part. He said, Mrs. Graf reported, that the man who demanded the money was a convict who had been in the county jail for a number of years.

Brennan is said to be an iron worker by trade, and has records at Los Angeles and San Quentin and Folsom prisons, according to police reports. Portland police are guarding all entrances to the city in the belief that the man who held up the Grafs is hiding there.

BULLS RULE IN MARKET

ISSUES RESPOND TO EASIER MONEY CONDITIONS

Score of New High Records Are Hung Up During the Period of Trading

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—(AP)—One of the most impressive bullish demonstrations of the summer took place in today's stock market. Responding to easier money conditions, and a grip of favorable trade news, prices of many leading issues were marked up two to ten points, with at least a score of new high records established during the day. Trading showed a marked expansion in volume, the day's sales aggregating 1,881,000 shares.

Call money renewed at 7 per cent, as against 7 1/2 yesterday, and dropped, consequently, to 5 1/2, 1 and 3 1/2 as a large supply of loanable funds came into the market. Time money and commercial paper rates held firm. Persistent reports were in circulation that federal reserve banks were buying bills in the open market to ease the tight money situation, which threatened the fall expansion of business, but these could not be confirmed.

General Motors closed eight points higher at 152 1/2 on buying stimulated by the urgent retreat of an overcrowded short interest. Chrysler touched a new record top at 88 1/2, and declined to 84 1/2 for a slight fractional net gain on the day. Packard closed \$1 for a net gain of more than four points and Studebaker closed more than three points higher. Packard, Dodge Brothers, Ford, and Chrysler were the most common and preferred. Radio was again a spectacular performer, scoring more than 10 points to 154. American Can climbed more than seven points to 85 1/2, the highest price since the 1926 split-up, and closed within a fraction of the top. Other issues to move into new high ground included Paramount Famous Lasky, Warner Brothers, A. H. Macy, Spang Co., National Cash Register, F. & W. Grand Stores and Jewel Tea. Sharp gains also were recorded by Montgomery Ward, C. S. Thrilling, National Tea and Woolworth.

war, irrespective of national origin. Further applause greeted out Mr. Coolidge's words as he praised the part taken by the veterans in the war.

"We have had a great deal of discussion concerning the injustice of one person going into the service at a very small remuneration while another remained at home in the enjoyment of very high wages," he said. "But I wonder how many of you who put on the uniform and went into action overseas would now be willing to exchange that experience for the few dollars of extra compensation that some one else was able to earn at home during the latter months of the war."

He was again interrupted by cheers when he said, "You are greater men for what you have given to your country. You hold a higher place of honor in the estimation of your fellow citizens, which no man could buy. You have a place and a name and a glory which you will hand down as a priceless heritage."

Reviews Results of War
Reviewing the results of the great war as they affected the United States, President Coolidge pointed out that one of the benefits conferred on this country was a stronger sense of national unity, cooperation and self-sacrifice for the good of the community.

Now Opposed to Smith

"All I know is what the anti-Smith Democrats told us at the conference in San Francisco a few days ago. Now those fellows are against Smith. They aren't Republicans and have no intention of becoming Republicans. They are with us this time. They have a ticket for this trip only on this train, and that's all."

"Before the end of the campaign I'm going to try to make the people decide between the two men, Hoover and Smith. They are the issues in this campaign. The Democrats have retreated from their long position for a low tariff; they are talking farm relief. In short, if you'll read the two platforms you'll find that there is very little difference between them; mostly a matter of phraseology in expressing the same things. Well, this being the case, the thing to do is to compare the two men, Hoover and Smith. I want to hold up these two men before the country and show their records, their ability, their fitness, yes, and their character. Let's educate the people as to the background of these two men so the people can judge which is the better for the responsibilities of the presidency. That does not mean a campaign of personalities, but a campaign of personalities."

"We ought to get some good odds," said Russell Hawkins, old-time friend of Senator Moses, who met him at the train.

Normally, the odds should be three to one, replied the senator, running his hand briskly over his Hoover campaign button, which nestled in the buttonhole of his lapel. "When I left home for the coast they were two and a half to one."

Have you noticed the odds in New York? inquired Hawkins. "Say," quoth the senator from New Hampshire, who once owned a newspaper, "those odds down in Wall street make the prices are mighty shrewd guys and they generally know what they are doing. I've had a man down there in their offices trying to get odds, but they won't give odds that Smith

will carry New York. Pretty wise birds, those boys."

AMEDEO GRILLO BESTS SHERER IN SIX ROUNDS

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Aug. 15.—(AP)—Amedeo Grillo, newcomer to the light heavyweight ranks from Italy, made an impressive American debut tonight by whipping Charles Sherer, of Sandusky, Ohio, in a six round preliminary to the Robert-Risko heavyweight match. Grillo, like the brown-skinned, capable puncher with either hand, battered Sherer badly about the body. The Ohio youngster was in distress both in the fifth and sixth rounds. There were no knockdowns. Grillo weighed 172, Sherer 185.

Harry Wills Is Second

Harry Wills, once challenger for Jack Dempsey's crown, acted as a second for Grillo and promised to do the same for Roberto Roberti, the Italian giant in the main bout of the night with Johnny Risko.

In a four-round preliminary, Jack Segon, of Brooklyn, 163, outpointed Bill Lancaster, of Orlando, Fla., 155 1/2.

Two heavyweights of the younger light, Lou Barba of New York and Johnny Urban of Pittsburgh, worked through the first eight rounds. Barba won the decision but their efforts attracted nothing but bores from the crowd of 13,000. The New Yorker was energetic but ineffective while Urban was very careful. Barba scaled 193; Urban 189 1/2.

She was being fed about every two hours. Lump sugar and coffee was the only food given her today, after she had had two poached eggs for breakfast.

GEORGE URGED TO BOLT

REV. STRATON HOPES SOLOMON WILL TURN FROM AL

Wants Him to Break from the Machine "Dominated by Tammany Hall Corruption"

GREENWOOD LAKE, N. Y., Aug. 15.—(AP)—The Rev. John Roach Straton, in letters to Senator George of Georgia, and Josephus Daniels, former secretary of the navy, today called upon those Democratic leaders to turn their political allegiance from Governor Alfred E. Smith to "the moral and religious forces which will of last sweep the south."

Appealing to Senator George as "my old-time friend and room-mate during the happy college days in Georgia," the clergyman counseled him "in love and, I believe, in true wisdom" to "forget the seeming temporary advantage connected with a wrong political alignment and take your time even though it may mean a temporary break for you with the Democratic machine as now dominated by the forces of Tammany hall corruption."

Because of my love and admiration for you, as a public servant elected by the Democrats, but I firmly believe that, if you knew Smith's record as we know it up here, and could see the dark and sinister forces which are working for his election, in order that they may dominate him in the president's office as they dominated him as a New York official, you would revolt even as Senator Simmons, Senator Owen, our old chum Congressman Upshaw, Vance McCormick and a host of other true patriots who put country before party have revolted."
