MANUFACTURERS GUARANTEE AGAINST DEFECTS ONLY

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—One hundred twenty-five thousand automobile tire dealers received today a revised warranty on pneumatic tires against defects for the entire life of the tire. The announcement comes from 44 manufacturers representing 95 per cent of the industry. General Lincoln C. Andrews, director general of the rubber institute, said today, "This applies to tires now in use as well as future deliveries." said General Andrews, "If failure of a pneumatic tire is caused by a fault in workmanship or material the manufacturer will adjust or replace according to the circumstances, regardless of length of time the tire has been in use or the distance it has traveled."
