

# TOPEKA DOLLED UP IN TOKEN TO CURTIS

## Republican Hosts Join with Kansas in Celebration

### MARTS IN GALA ATTIRE

Away From the Growing Crows,  
Curtis Spends Most of the  
Day in Family Reunion  
at His Residence

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 17.—(AP)—In the heart of America's farm lands where the party fought its pre-convention battle, Republican hosts were assembling tonight to join with Kansas in its celebration tomorrow at the formal nomination of Senator Curtis of his nomination for vice-president by the Republican convention.

Republican leaders arriving today from all sections of the country found Topeka gaily decorated with flags, bunting and colorful lanterns. While the national political leaders talked over politics generally they found the Kansans thinking principally of the prices for their bumper crops and the celebration for "Charlie" Curtis.

From almost every place of prominence hung a large picture of Senator Curtis. Next week when Herbert Hoover, the party's presidential nominee, travels across this state on his return to Washington the Kansans will give him their attention. Senator Capper and David McVane, Republican national committeemen, will go with the party to West Branch, Iowa, where he will expound again his views on agriculture.

**Senator Greets His Kin**  
While Senator Feas, of Ohio, who will not attend Curtis of his nomination tomorrow, and a delegation of New Yorkers headed by Matthew Quay, Glaser, president of the state, gave his attention to meeting members of the family who came from the east. He was at the station with a sister, Mrs. R. Colvin, of this city, to welcome another sister, Mrs. E. Gann, of Washington, and his daughter, Mrs. Leona Curtis, of Providence, R. I.

Away from the growing crowds about the hotel, Senator Curtis spent most of the remainder of the day in the family reunion at his home. Curtis was born in Topeka but that was in a log cabin on the north side.

**Heavy Rain Dampens Ardor**  
A heavy rain started early in the afternoon and threw a scare into the hearts of those who have counted on the outdoor celebration on the state house grounds tomorrow. But Senator Curtis, smiling and placed his reliance in the weather man who had promised an "ideal day" tomorrow.

Work today was centered on completion of the speakers' stand on the south side of the state house and the arrangements for the radio broadcasting of the exercises. The exercises will start at 5 p. m. on a standard time, although a musical program by several bands will get under way an hour ahead. Governor Ben Paulsen will introduce Senator Feas, who in a brief address will notify Senator Curtis formally of his nomination. In a speech, expected to take about 30 minutes for delivery, Senator Curtis will accept the nomination and give his first expressions on the pending campaign.

**Capper Thinks West Solid**  
Discussing the political situation today, Senator Capper said: "There is no doubt about Kansas and I think that will hold for the west generally."

"A drop in hopes has dampened some of the prices of the farmers," he said. "They have just harvested bumper crops. But the farmers have accepted the agricultural statement of Herbert Hoover. Mr. Hoover's speech of acceptance has been a big hit."

Coming in from Ohio where he was just renominated without opposition as Republican senatorial candidate, Senator Feas declared "things look good, mighty good."

From far off Florida, Lawrence Y. Sherman, a former senator from Illinois, declared "we have a chance of cracking the state wide open."

**INDIAN TREK TO TOPEKA**  
Braves in Feathers and Paint to Do Tribal Dance

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 17.—(AP)—An "American of America" wins new honors officially tomorrow when Senator Curtis, tomorrow, is notified of his nomination by the Republicans for vice-president and there are going to be Indians here in full dress regalia to solemnize the affair.

Wearing their eagle feathers and war paint, some members of the Pawnee nation will come in early tomorrow from their reservation near Topeka to perform the eagle dance, a tribal religious ceremony. The dance will be given on Kansas avenue prior to the nomination exercises.

Lined with Indian Grandmother as a lad, Senator Curtis lived occasionally with his grandmother, Julie Pappan, granddaughter of White Plume, chief of the Kaws. But one moonlight night she stole to his side by the campfire on the Indian reservation and told him: "Go back to your white ancestors, my boy."

He did, but has never lost the love of the prairie life with the Indians and tomorrow he will have another reminder of those days as he is notified of his highest honor.

George Glee Forester, from Senator George the governor was given first hand information as to the political outlook in

the "solid south," which supplemented reports given to him earlier in the week by Senator Glavin of Virginia, and Josephus Daniels, former secretary of the navy, who is a newspaper publisher at Raleigh, N. C.

Like the three leaders who had preceded him here, Senator Walsh, widely known for his activities as prosecutor of the senate oil inquiries is a pronounced dry. A while during the pre-convention the Democratic presidential nomination, but withdrew before the quadrennial party gathering at Houston, George, however, was a candidate for the nomination to the last. To all of his visitors Governor Smith has disclosed what he will say regarding prohibition in his acceptance speech, with a view to getting their reaction.

**Paces Before Movie Camera**  
After the departure of Senator George, the governor spent most of the morning in the rear yard at the executive mansion before a talking delivery of his acceptance speech. Movie camera men, however, were not allowed to get within 100 feet of the nominee. He was confident that it has been an ordeal—that he could only do his acting in the hot sun, and that frequently passing clouds held up the sun.

"Wait Till the Clouds Roll By," he told visitors. The governor went through the poses after viewing talking movies of Herbert Hoover delivering his address of acceptance.

**Zoo Animal Ambles Away**  
On top of his many worries the nominee disclosed that one of the members of his zoo also had caused him a few anxious moments.

It was discovered that a deer had disappeared. It was the occupant of the pen built for Sam Houston, the donkey that died of pneumonia recently a few weeks after his arrival here from the Texas state capital. The entire gubernatorial staff joined in a search, and had about concluded that their pet had skipped out through one of the open gates to the street, when one of the governor's daughters spotted the animal in a flower bed, almost completely covered by waist high foliage.

As he mopped perspiration from his forehead, the governor decided that the deer had sought refuge from the intense heat which has gripped the state for some days.

**Walsh Praises Nominee**  
The Montana senator said at the outset of his statement that he had "heretofore just barely met Governor Smith, but neither of us had ever found the opportunity to cultivate the other."

"His personality is irresistible and his intellectual processes refreshingly clear," he declared, adding that the nominee's "quick mastery of problems of state signifies a genius for such."

"I notice," the senator continued, "that an honored but more or less erratic Democrat from the west who served with distinction with me in the senate has gone over to the Republican party by reason of Governor Smith's affiliation with Gamman—cheerfully or resignedly aligning himself with an organization that avidly avails itself of the aid of the Vire and Mellon machines in Pennsylvania, and the Big Bill machine in Illinois, all three of which made contributions of moment to the choice of the candidate with whom my friend casts his fortunes."

**Lays Lash on Bolter**  
"If one is to be judged by his political associates how shall we Republican nominee escape condemnation? He sat in the cabinet with Fall and Daugherty without ever raising his hand to thwart their villainies while they were being perpetrated or raising his voice in condemnation of them after they were exposed."

"The shocking ineptitudes of two other official associates, Forbes and Mellon, escaped his notice if they were not shielded by his tolerance. As remarked by a shrewd lady in a letter made public by the press, 'if from his vantage point he didn't know in a general way what was going on, he hasn't sagacity enough to be president of the United States.'"

the findings of the prehistoric animal's colossus.

Several of the bones brought back are as large as the body of a modern man. The humerus is four feet long and the collar bone is a full foot for a strong colossus. The relics include several splendidly preserved ribs and sections of the spine.

"We left the pelvis bone and several other parts in a clay hillside," said Walter Granger. "We are planning to return and get all of the skeleton."

**Beast Larger Than Jumbo**  
Mr. Andrews said the beast was about twice the size of "Jumbo," the famous circus elephant of the old P. T. Barnum shows in America, and circus men claimed that Jumbo weighed ten tons. He calculated that he could have worn a top hat and stood under the great beast without touching its belly.
