Electric Light Good Balt. Mount Vernen, Ill. Chauncey Houch-in, Fred Van Nada and Hex Fowler. White river fishermen, have invented a plan which has been helpful to them in catching fish. They made an averagement for lighting the water, which attracted hundreds of fish to the place, and these eagerly bit at the balt dropped to them on books. The catches were unusually large. The arrangement for lighting the water consisted of eight dry batteries, to which an electric light was attached and dropped into the water. The wire was heavily insulated to prevent charging the water with electricity.
