## Montana McClellan Dead

(Ridgeway)  
Montana J. McClellan was born in Florida on February 26, 1902, and died in The Dalles, Oregon on November 5, 1915. While a baby, her parents moved on their homestead at Ridgeway, where they have made their home ever since. She was apparently in good health until a few days before her death. She fell ill Sunday and was taken to Shaniko Monday evening where it was found she was suffering from typhoid, and was removed to the hospital in The Dalles, where she died on the following Friday and was buried in The Dalles Saturday. Besides her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McClellan, two sisters survive, Miss Nina McClellan of this place and Mrs. Cornelia Kentner of Kent.

James Gray made a trip to White River last Friday after a load of sand for the new Barzee hotel under construction here.

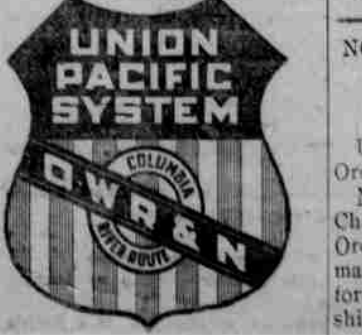
