

A standard key-socket is fastened to a brass bushing secured to the center of a brass plate, flat or crowned, that covers a brass tube one and one-half inches high and in diameter to fit into the chimney holder. The wire is led up to the socket through a hole in the side of the brass tube. In the accompanying diagram 1 is a reinforced flexible wire with rubber insulation covered with silk or cotton to match the surroundings; J. attachment plug that will fit any socket that is now in general use; K, if opening happens to be extra large at this point, place a piece of mica or glass with color to match the shade .- New York World.



Pursuing Mental Hygiene.

Believing that many persons at present confined in institutions for mental so that the distance between two endefectives could be completely cured if more humane methods of treatment and may be as much as one hundred were used, the Rockefeller foundation will conduct an investigation this winter into the custody and treatment of insane in state institutions, according to part four of its annual report.

It will be the plan of the foundation to obtain a universal system of handling mental defective cases. Dr. Thomas W. Salmon of the United States public health service has obtained a leave of absence from the government to take charge of the work. He will be responsible to the national committee for mental hygiene, which is composed of trustees of the foundation.


