Trading Stamp Act

The trading stamp act passed by the Legislature of 1915 is unconstitutional and void, so decided by the United States District Court at Portland on October 4th, 1915. The decision is now final, and trading stamps may lawfully be issued by any merchant in Oregon.

The Sunday Closing Law

The decision of the Oregon Supreme Court, declaring the Sunday closing law void, was passed over by me in preparing this issue, because I was of the opinion that the Federal Court would declare the law unconstitutional and void whenever the case should come before that tribunal. In that opinion I was mistaken; for the United States District Court (three judges) concurring on January 31st, 1916, at Portland, Oregon, rendered a decision in the Brunswick-Balfe-Collider Company, holding the law valid and sound. The hearing on the prayer for a permanent injunction against the law came before United States Circuit Judge Gilbert, United States District Judge Cushman and United States District Judge Wolverton. The law prohibits the keeping open of any store, shop, grocery, ball alley, billiard room, or tipping place, for the purpose of labor or traffic, or any place of amusement, on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, or the Lord's day. The law exempts drug stores, doctor shops, undertakers, livery-stable keepers, theaters, butchers and bakers. The Court holds that the State of Oregon had the right to adopt the law, that the law is not in conflict with the State and Federal Constitution, and that it is a valid exercise of the police power of the State of Oregon. This decision is final, and puts the matter of retaining or repealing the law up to the people of the State.
