### COUNTY AGENT'S NEWS ARTICLES

#### Dufur Colt Show

June 24 there is to be held in the little town of Dufur, Wasco county a colt show, which, to our knowledge, will be an innovation in the Northwest, but one which might be emulated with advantage in every farming community in the state.

Dufur is situated in one of Oregon's finest agricultural districts east of the Cascades. Consequently the town is surrounded by prosperous farmers, who as a rule keep horses above the average in breed and value. Hence it is quite likely that the Dufur Colt Show is intended to stimulate the raising of work horses rather than to cater to racing or fancy driving animals. It seems that Dufur can make of this an annual event of great importance to the town, to Wasco county and to the state.

It costs not a penny more to raise a colt that will sell at 5 years old for \$150 than it does to raise one worth but \$75 to \$100, saying nothing about those worth far less. —Editorial in Oregonian.
