**Why Not Face the Facts About Armor Competition?**

**To the People:**

The policy of the United States Government for many years has made real competition in armor-making ineffective.

The Government might have asked the three armor plants for bids and let the entire tonnage to the lowest bidder. That would have made competition effective.

The result of such a course would have been to drive two of the three manufacturers out of business, and leave the country with facilities of only one plant in time of need.

**The Government in fact has always asked for bids from the three manufacturers, but no matter what the price quoted, each year's business was divided among them.**

Armor makers serve but one customer—the Government, just as a public utility serves but one customer—a community.

The solution of the public utility problem is regulation of rates.

The solution of the armor problem is for the Government to fix the price.

We voluntarily agree to accept any price fixed by the Federal Trade Commission. Isn't acceptance of that offer better than the destruction of an industry built solely to serve the Government?

Have you ever lost a crop of hay through musing—or your barn and hay through spontaneous combustion? There is one sure way to prevent this—

The salt more than pays for itself in the weight of the hay. There is a further gain in weight through moisture held—and the stock will eat up salted hay clean where unsalted hay will be trampled over and wasted.

20 pounds of salt should be used to each ton of hay. Sprinkle three feet of hay, sprinkle the salt over this by hand. Then another layer of hay, more salt, and so on. Experiments carried out at the Wisconsin experiment station indicate that salt should be supplied to dairy cows unless the ration furnishes a sufficient quantity thereof. It is calculated that the minimum quantity in the food to keep a cow of 1000 lb. live weight in flourishing health is that which is equivalent to 3-4 oz. salt per day, and that a cow in milk needs as much more as will restore the proportion removed in the milk, namely, a little over 1-2 oz. of salt for every 20 lb. of milk.
