Have you ever lost a crop of hay through musting—or
your barn and hay through spontaneous combustion?

There is one sure way to prevent this—

USE SALT when you stack your hay IT PAYS

The Salt more than pays for itself in the weight of
the hay. There is a further gain in weight through
moisture held—and the stock will eat up salted hay
clean where unsalted hay will be mussed over and
wasted.

20 pounds of salt should be used to each ton of hay.
Stack three feet of hay, sprinkle the salt over this by
hand. Then another layer of hay, more salt and so on.

Experiments carried on at the Wisconsin Experi-
ment station indicate that salt should be supplied to
dairy cows unless the ration furnishes a sufficiency
thereof. It is calculated that the minimum quantity in
the food to keep a cow of 1000 lb. live weight in flour-
ishing health is that which is equivalent to 3-4 oz. salt
per day, and that a cow in milk needs as much more as
will restore the proportion removed in the milk, namely
a little over 1-2 oz. of salt for every 20 lb. of milk.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Every animal or article must be entered for compe-
tition in the name of the bona fide owner or maker,
whose number must be indorsed on the entry card.

On the entry of each animal or article a card will
be furnished each exhibitor, specifying the class and
number of the entry; said cards to remain attached to
such animal or article during the exhibition, excepting
cattle, sheep, hogs and poultry, which shall be
attached to the pens.

Exhibitors will at all times give the necessary and
personal attention to what ever they may have on
exhibition and at the close of the fair take entire
charge of the same. The board of directors will use
every precaution in their power for the safe preserva-
tion of all articles and stock on exhibition, but will
not be accountable for loss or damage.

Premiums will not be awarded to inferior collections
of specimens, even if there is no competition.
Exhibits grown on bottom or irrigated lands can-
not compete for premiums listed under the head of
non-irrigated exhibits.

All live stock entering under the head of registered
animals. The registration papers must be filed with
the secretary, if no registration papers they may be
entered as graded animals.
