AGED PIONEER FOUND DEAD

Monday afternoon on going to the home of John Cotter on the bluff above the power plant, H. L. Morris found him sitting in a chair dead. Mr. Morris notified other neighbors and Dr. Elwood was called from here. Mr. Cotter had probably died either Saturday or Sunday morning. The evidence was so conclusive that death came naturally that it was not thought necessary to hold an inquest.

The remains were buried Tuesday in the cemetery near Tygh.

Mr. Cotter was a German and a pioneer of this section, living alone on his ranch above White river. He was about 72 years old.
