Death at Tygh

A. G. Anderson, for 15 years a resident of Grass Valley, died at three o'clock Sunday morning in Tygh Valley, where the family had moved last December. Mr. Anderson had suffered from diabetes for ten years. He was born in Gottenburg, Sweden in 1855, had followed the sea eight years, and was a gallant fisherman on the lower Columbia eleven years. While there he resided at Skomokawa, Wn., where he married Lucretia E. Soper, August 22, 1892. To this union were born three children, two sons and one daughter, Emil Anderson of Dufur Ore, Miss Myrtle Anderson and Abner Anderson of Tygh Valley. The funeral was held at the church and interment in the Odd Fellows' cemetery at Tygh Valley.
