ITALIAN TROOPS ARE CLOSE TO TRIESTE

General Cadorna Within Few Miles of Austria's Queen City on the Adriatic.

Rome. — Italy's mountain-fighting fighters are within a few miles of Trieste, Austria's queen city of the Adriatic. The Italians have fought their way forward to within a few miles of Duino, the most formidable natural barrier between them and Trieste. Vienna refuses to concede the Italian victories, but the map tells the story of General Cadorna's steady advance.

Duino, at the gates of which the Italian guns are now hammering, marks a point at which the Carso plateau almost touches the sea. Protected by the ocean on the one side, it is powerfully defended to the north by Mount Querceto, a height of considerable magnitude, which dominates the country for many miles around.

At the foot of Mount Querceto, facing west, lies the little town of Medonza and the Italians have smashed their way to within a few hundred yards of this village. It is possible that a hill will occur before they attempt the formidable task of storming Mount Querceto.

Italy has proved her supremacy in the air also during extensive raiding operations of the past few days.

Trieste is most directly menaced. In the Adriatic there is a formidable fleet of British and Italian ships, whose bombardment has done havoc to the Austrian coast defenses. With the Italian army itself are ten units of British field artillery.

76 KILLED IN AIR RAID ON ENGLAND

London. — German airplanes, to the number of about 15, raided southeast England and according to an official statement 76 persons were killed and 174 persons wounded. Of the killed 37 were women and 23 were children, while 43 women and 29 children were injured.

Nearly all the damage occurred in one town, where some bombs fell in the streets, causing considerable casualties among the civilian population.

The worst damage done was from a group of bombs which struck the business thoroughfare thronged with people. At one spot here 15 women, eight men and nine children were killed and 43 persons were injured.

As soon as the raiders had dropped their bombs they turned back, British and French airplanes met the Germans on the way, and spirited air fighting occurred with the result that three of the raiders were shot down.

Seattle City Employee Declared Responsible for Attacks on Registration.

Seattle, Wash. — Hulet M. Wells, ex-president of the Seattle Central Labor Council, and Sam Eadler, formerly connected with the Local 8000's union, were arrested by a representative of the United States secret service, charged with having participated in the circulation of alleged wall-paper literature, consisting of anti-draft circulars distributed throughout Seattle the past fortnight.

According to secret service agents, Wells is at the head of the Seattle branch of the "No Conscription League," which has flooded Seattle with anti-draft handbills and other literature and painted on fences and sidewalks, in large red letters, exhortations to "resist conscription." Sidewalks all over town have been daubed with these words nightly.

Fate of Russia Depends on Coulters.

Petrograd, via London. — Virtually all the divergent political factions, all class organizations, councils and even the socialist leaders, with the exception of the extreme leftists, recognize the appeal of Vladimir Warshavsky to the troops and support the new order of the day, "advancing."

No U. S. Warships Sunk in War Zone.

Washington. — A categorical denial that any American naval vessels have been sunk in the war was issued by Secretary Daniels to counteract a "campaign of vicious rumors that is being carried on so industriously by persons unknown."

LIFE AND PROPERTY LOST IN TORNADOES

Chicago. — More than 200 persons were killed, 2400 or more injured and millions of dollars' worth of property destroyed by tornadoes which swept through Kansas, Illinois and Indiana on Saturday, and parts of Tennessee, Arkansas, Kentucky and southern Illinois, Sunday.

Reports indicate that a large amount of farm implements, needed to produce the bumper crop destined this year, was ruined. Crop damage is said to be not heavy in grains.

The heaviest toll of life was taken at Mattoon, Ill., where 54 are known to be dead and 509 injured, with a property loss of \$2,000,000.

Charleston, Ill., 10 miles east of Mattoon, was also partly wrecked, with a loss of 23 lives and 150 injured. The property loss there is \$1,000,000.

The next most serious loss was at Andale, Kan., where 26 were killed and a score injured.

Reports from Indiana show at least seven persons killed at Hebron, Kouts and other places, and the death list may reach 20. More than 200 were injured in the Indiana territory swept by the storm.

German Republic Aim of Organization

New York. — Germans here have formed an organization called the "Friends of the German Republic," whose object is the dethronement of Kaiser William and the establishment of a republic. The organization is said to be nation-wide in scope, has headquarters and has issued an appeal to Germans to help in its propaganda.

Sims to Be Vice Admiral.

Washington. — President Wilson soon will nominate Rear-Admiral Sims to a vice-admiral in view of his position as commander of American naval forces co-operating with the allies in European waters.

100,000 Americans Seen in France.

London. — An official statement issued there says that counting the Americans serving in the British and French armies and the additional units ordered to France, there will shortly be 100,000 Americans in France.

McNary Named to Succeed Senator.

Salem, Ore. — Judge Charles L. McNary, republican, of Salem, was appointed United States senator for Oregon by Governor Withycombe, to succeed Senator Harry Lane.
