IMMENSE EXCAVATIONS COMPLETED

Fine Grade

The extensive excavations which have been in operation this summer preparing the location for the Maupin Warehouse and elevator, the new O. T. depot and side-tracks, and a wide wagon grade leading to them, were completed Saturday. The work covers a distance of about half a mile in length, and varying from 50 to 200 feet in width. A ditch below the warehouse and beside the track for nearly a quarter of a mile, 12 feet deep and 30 feet wide has been filled in with part of the earth from the excavations above.

The elevator also is about complete, a report of which we hope to have next week.
