Floyd Kelly Writes

Philadelphia, Pa., League Island Navy Yard, Nov. 11, 1917.

I am now enlisted in the United States Navy and am stationed at present in the League Island Navy yard at Philadelphia, Pa.

First I wish to say Hello to all of my old friends through the columns of your paper. There are a great many boys stationed here and it is sure a pretty sight to see all the men in the field in their blue uniforms drilling. There are boys here from almost every state in the union. But there is a feeling of universal friendship throughout the entire camp and a fellow is heartily welcomed to camp. It makes one feel as though they were all old friends.

We have good comfortable quarters and plenty to eat and that with a letter from home now and then is what it takes to make a happy Jack Tar.

We have shore liberty every day if we want it.

Philadelphia is a queer old town and never ceases to be of interest to the westerner. It is only a few

minutes ride from the navy yard on the street car.

I cannot speak in too high praise of the work of the Y. M. C. A. We have a real nice one here. It is provided with reading tables, a piano, a graphophone, a large open brick fireplace, a swimming tank and a counter where you can buy tobacco and sweets for considerably less than they cost at the stores in town. Some evenings moving pictures are shown free of charge. Free stationery and ink are furnished and stamps can be bought. There is also a library from which books can be borrowed for three days' time. So when the Y. M. C. A. calls for money don't forget what a great thing you are doing for the comfort and amusement of the homesick boys who are serving your Uncle Sammy. We are generally given tickets to concerts, football games, etc., and often times our carfare is paid for us too. I have had no chance to see examples of Red Cross work yet, but I believe the world is fortunate to have such an organization and one should feel it a pleasure to contribute all you can to it.
