Lumber shipments this year promise to reach the 1,000,000,000 mark, 2,-000,000 feet in excess of any previous record. Water shipments to date are 247,259,000 feet. Rail shipments for the past five months total 409,780,00 feet and while the figures for the first five months are not available it is estimated that these totaled about 150,-000,000 feet. These figures place lum ber shipments of Grays Harbor for sale this year in excess of 800,000,000 feet. Home consumption of lumber has been the heaviest on record, due to the shipbuilding boom since the war




