Stuart, J. M. Conklin. And please say this for me that President Wilson is a world wonder. We are getting the best of food and clothing and plenty of it. We aren't in the front yet but expecting to be there at any moment. Not one sick, so tell the boys to have courage, that we are winning sure. We will make the Germans look pretty badly when we get at them. We all want to go but we must wait until the proper time for we are going to beat them bad.
