The Red Cross

I wonder if you wouldn't like to hear from the headquarters of the society here in Wasco county. We just came from there and it is quite a bee-hive of industry.

The whole of the first floor of the old court house is given over to the Red Cross society. One large room is the office where the able secretary, Miss Anne Lang presides. Here the clerical work is done, all material received and sent out again, and the finished garments received and accounted for. Then they are packed in boxes and shipped to Seattle, division headquarters.

Another room is used as a cutting room, sometimes, and at other times as a packing room. One room holds four long tables that will each seat ten persons comfortably at work, and here the gauge work is done. In a small adjoining

room, one long table covered with black oil cloth is where the gauge is cut by experienced hands for the workers which crowd the other tables, and from here thousands of pieces of hospital supplies have gone on their errands of mercy. Another room is used on certain days as a kindergarten for the children whose mothers may be at work in adjoining rooms.

There are three machines, one an electric, and an electric iron, and all sorts of articles that could be needed around a hospital are made—sheets, pillow-slips, towels, pajamas, etc. All scraps are put to use. Of the larger pieces quilt blocks are cut, the next size make gun wipes, and from the tiny scraps "feathers" for making small pillows used on the stretchers are made.

The hospital supplies are watched by women who understand all the necessary "kinks" of which there seem a good many to the uninitiated; counted by three women at a table in a room of the office, tied in bundles holding just so many of each particular kind, packed in boxes of prescribed dimensions, everything according to specifications of National headquarters governing all chapters.

All work must pass a rigid examination. In the office several women sit day after day passing on the knitted work brought or sent in. Minor defects are remedied, such as adjusting the necks of sweaters, seeing that the tops of socks are not too small, or darn ing holes left by inexperienced hands, and sometimes returning the garment to be made over.

All the time the cry is for more workers to do the ever increasing amount of work that is called for from National headquarters. Are we all "doing our bit?"
