\$5000 TO BE EXPENDED ON Maupin Grade

(Pine Grove)

Dee Wright and N. G. Hedin, acting for the Wapinitia Plains Commercial Club as a committee waited on the Honorable County Court and Commissioners at The Dalles last Wednesday, 6th of February in the interest of road improvement on the Upper Flat and in regards to changing the grade on upper half of the Maupin hill grade. Roadmaster Sharp and Highway Engineer Elliott were also interviewed. The committee obtained the promise of \$200 for use on the Upper Flat road, provided the farmers showed a desire to co-operate and volunteer some work to go with the spending of the money. This volunteer work is assured. The county commissioners also promised the committee that the district shall have \$5000 to be used in changing the grade providing it is found by the Engineers Sharp and Elliott that a 5 per cent grade is possible. In any case the \$5000 has been guaranteed and improvement to that amount or more will be available soon. The large petition will be circulated by the representatives of Wapinitia and Maupin, and it is now urged that all men and women, freeholders support this work and sign the petition in order that a solid front be presented to the commissioners so they may see that the Plains people are vitally of one mind in favor of this practical and beneficial improvement.
