Federal Land Bank

4 1-2 per cent Farm Loan Bonds Redeemable at par and accrued interest on any interest paying date after 5 years from date of issue. Denominations \$1000, \$500, \$100, \$50 and \$25. Interest payable semi-annually at any Federal Land Bank, payable in gold or lawful money, netting about 4.40 per cent to the redeemable date, 1922, and 4 1-2 per cent so long as they may remain outstanding thereafter.

The Farm Loan Bonds issued under the provisions of this Act shall be deemed and held to be instrumentalities of the Government of the United States, and as such, they and the income derived therefrom, shall be exempt from federal, state, municipal and local taxation.

Dr. Stovall has made arrangements with the War Department to buy horses at Maupin April 8th for the U. S. Government. Cavalry horses 15 hands or over in height and weighing from 1000 to 1200 pounds, free from blemish and broke to ride and drive will bring \$140 each.

Mules 15 3-4 to 16 1-2 hands high and weighing 1200 to 1400 pounds will bring \$215 each. This is an exceptionally good price and everyone who has horses or mules to sell will do well to get them in shape as this will probably be the only chance soon to furnish Uncle Sam with horses for war purposes.
