## Irish to Get Home Rule

The Irish are about to receive Home Rule, but only on consideration that conscription shall be the price. Davie Lloyd George the British prime minister made the boldest stroke of his career by coupling two measures, that of Home Rule for Ireland with the Conscription of Irishmen.

The English parliament is now willing under dire necessity to concede to Ireland what the late John Redmond has worked for all his life time, when the militarization of all the man power of British possession is a necessity, yet there is much skepticism as to whether the war cabinet could frame a measure which would stand the test, and the fear that the country might be plunged again into the old fury of the Irish quarrel while fighting for its life against enemies outside its walls. It was of this fear that the Asquith government shelved the old home-rule act, but Mr. Lloyd George, however, is daring enough

to attempt to balance both debts by granting home rule and enforcing conscription. Public opinion in England is now stronger than parliament and demands that the Irish question shall not stand in the way of winning the war.

The Irish Naturalist leader, John Dillon is more firey in resisting conscription than his predecessor John Redmond. If Lloyd George is successful in conciliating the Irish people and gaining the support of all available man power he will achieve a victory greater than that of the sword.
