4 1-2 per cent Farm Loan Bonds Redeemable at par and accrued interest on any interest paying date after 5 years from date of issue. Denominations \$1000, \$500, \$100, \$50 and \$25. Interest payable semi-annually at any Federal Land Bank, payable in gold or lawful money, netting about 4.40 per cent to the redeemable date, 1922, and 4 1-2 per cent so long as they may remain outstanding thereafter.

The Farm Loan Bonds issued under the provisions of this Act shall be deemed and held to be instrumentalities of the Govern-

ment of the United States, and as such, they and the income derived therefrom, shall be exempt from federal, state, municipal and local taxation.
