RESIDENT OF TYGH IS DEAD

Constantine Van Woodruff was born September 5, 1843, at Lyander, N. Y., and passed away May 23rd, 1918, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. G. Morris, The Dalles, Oregon, at the age of 74 years, 8 months and 19 days, in his early childhood his parents moved to Illinois. Here he grew to manhood. He was married to Mary J. Van Valkenburgh, October 4, 1865, at Polo, Illinois. He was a veteran of the Civil war. Moved to Oregon in 1874, having lived in Wasco county since September, 1886. He is survived by two children, George H. Woodruff Tygh Valley, and Mrs. W. G. Morris, The Dalles, three grand children and one great grand child.

In his passing to the beyond we have lost a noble, true man who was loved by all who knew him. His happy smile and voice of welcome will be missed by all his loved ones, his host of friends and neighbors. We extend the bereaved family our heartfelt sympathy.
