Makes Record

Portland, 6, 7, '18

Editor Maupin Times:

We left the homestead at 5:30 this morning; stopped at Government Camp for lunch; arrived at Summit house 11 a. m. Four miles below the summit we broke the bolt that goes through the front spring which necessitated the removal of the spring; time required for making repairs, one hour and thirty minutes. Arrived at toll gate 1:55 p. m., stopped once more for lunch, arriving in Portland at 5 p. m. We filled the gas tank at Wapinitia and drove to the homestead, and from there to Portland, and the dial read 98.2 miles, and we still have five gallons of gas in the tank.

There will be others that will make better time, but I think I hold the record for gas.

We found no snow and but very little mud. From the Clear creek road to Frog lake the road is rough and from there to Government Camp exceedingly rough. Also below the toll gate for several miles the road is very bad.

Called Higher

A beautiful Christian life has just been terminated here in the passing of Grandma Winifree.

Melesia M. Dickerson was born at Crocket, Texas, March 14, 1837 and died June 7, 1918, aged 81 years, 3 months and 21 days.

A few of her early years were spent in Louisiana, and there she married William Winifree.

Moving to Huston county, Texas ten children were born to them, seven dying at an early age. Surviving are Isaac N. of Maupin, Philip W. of Sandy, Oregon and Anna Fraley of Texas.

Much of her life was spent on the frontiers and the hardships of those times were lightened by her cheerful character. Being a school teacher, Mrs. Winifree did an important work in moulding the early life and character of many of the children of early Texas.

She had been a member of the M. E. church since 1851.
