## Mice Exterminated

In order that they might start the wheat season with their plant in A-1 condition the Hunts Ferry Warehouse Company has given its plant a thorough fumigation. The job was superintended by Mr. Frank H. Lathrop, assistant entomologist of the Oregon Agricultural College. Mr. Covey, the manager of the plant, has received the following congratulatory letter from Mr. Lathrop.

Dear Mr. Covey,

At this time I feel that it will not be out of place to extend to you my congratulations upon the action which you have just taken to completely free your warehouse

and elevator of destructive pests before the new grain begins coming in.

The cyanide fumigation which you used is the most effective process which you could have employed, and it should enable you to start the season with a clean plant. You and your firm are certainly to be highly commended upon your efforts to conserve foodstuffs at this time when such material is of such great importance to the nation. Therefore, your action, undertaken as it was, not through compulsion, but entirely upon your own initiative, should be regarded in the light of a patriotic service to the country.
