'Clown Quince' to Kaiser

The following was taken from a newspaper published in France and sent to Nevada relatives by a Nevada doughboy, who is now fighting in France:

"On the run, Somewhere in France, at the time.
Dear Papa:

I am writing on der run as der grave und glorions soldiers under my command have not seen der Rhine for so lond dot dey have started back dot vey, und of course I am going mit dem. Oh, papa, der has been some offel tings happened in France. First, I started in my big offensive, which was to crush der fool Americans, but dey know so litle about military tactics dat dey vill not be crush jooost like I want dem. I sent my men in der big vaves, and ven dey got to de Americans dey all said 'Boo' as loudt as dey could hol. Er vell, according to vat you haf always saidt de Americans should haf turnd und run like blazes. But vat you tink? Dem fool Americans don't know any ting about var, und instead of running de odder vay, dey came right toward us. Some of dem vas sing ing about 'Ve von't come back till it's over, over dere,' or some odder foolish ting, und some of dem vere laffing like fools. Dey are so ignorant. But dey are awful roek less mit dere guns, und dey come back at us und don't wai no men cook der notion. dey wanted to go back to de dear oldt Rhine. Ve don't like der dirty Maro river anybow. Und oh papa, der Americans use such offel language. Dey know noddings of kultur und say such offel slings right before us. Und dey talk blasphemy, too. Vat you tink dey said right in front of my face? Von big husky man from a place dey call Missouri, he said—oh papa, I hate to tell you vat on offel ting he said—but I can't help it; he said—"To hell with the kaiser!" Did you ever hear any ting so offel? I didn't tink anybody would say such a ting. It made me so madt, I wouldn't stand und hear such on offel ting so I hurried und turned around und run mit der boys. Vas I right? Nat? Und, oh papa, you know dem breastplates vat you sent us—can you get some to put on our backs? You know we are going de odder vay, now, und der breastplates are no good, for der cowardly Americans are shooting us right in der back. Some of der boys took off deir breastplates and put dem on behindt, but der Americans are playing 'Der Starspangled Banner' on dem mit machine guns. Can't you help us? You remember in your speech you saidt noddng could stand before the brave German soldiers. O papa, I don't belief dese ignorant Americans ever read your speech for dey run after us jooost like ve vas a lot of rabbits. Vat you tink of dot? Can't you send dem some of your speeches right away? Dey don't see how terrible ve are. Can't you send my army back to Belgium vere ve von all our glory? My men can vip all der vimmun und children vat dem Belgians can bring us. But dese rough Americans are so ignorant, ve can't make dem understand dat ve are the greatest soldiers on earth, und ven ve try to sing 'Deutschland over allies,' dey laff like a lot of monkeys. Put ve are getting der best of der Americans. Ve can out run dem. Papa, if ve are not der best fighters on earth, ve are der best runners. Nobody can keep up mit us ven ve tink of der dear oldt Rhine, und my army never did tink so much of der dear

oldt river. Let me know vat to do by return postoffice.

The Home Service

The American Red Cross, the "greatest mother in the world" is trying to justify the trust placed in her. But they are the medium for reaching the immense resources of this great organization, which has its hand on the pulse and its sympathetic ear to the throbbing heart of the world. It is backed by our president and the great men of our own nation, and bowed down to by the kings of the world.

A Word About the Flag

There has been so much said about an American's duty during these trying times and so many big issues to meet that the little courtesies due our national flag have oftimes been neglected. Do you remember when the United States first entered the war how every home and place of business brought forth the colors? There were flags of all sizes every place.
