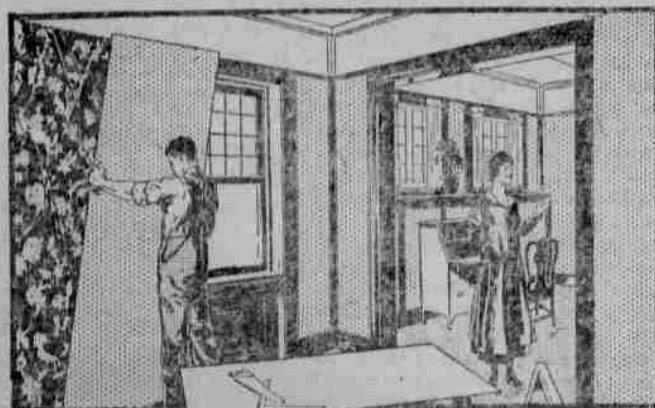

From France

France, December 15th, 1918.
Dear folks at home:

I have not written home for some time, but better late than never they say. Not have I received an answer to any letter since I left Ft. Ben Harrison, U. S. I do hope you are all well and haven't kicked in with the flu or something else of that nature.

You know, perhaps, the regulations governing letters have been modified so I now can tell you some of our doings since we hit this country.

To begin with, we were about twelve days getting to the front after we landed at Brest on September 21. We were thirteen days coming over. When about 200 miles from the French coast the subs gave us the very devil. They were after us from different directions. Twice we were fired on with torpedoes, but luckily we were not hit. We had a very strong convoy of destroyers and they gave the subs but little time for getting the range, etc. When that pro scope showed up they started to shoot right then. It sure is a wonderful sight to see about 20 of those speedy little ships go into action at the same time. Well after we landed we started wading mud in France and we are still wading the mud. The sun is shining today—the second day I have seen in four months. Out of the last 90 days it has rained 88 days; not all day always, but rained during the day.

We went up in the St. Michael section and took part in that drive, and it was some drive; too, believe me; one of the fiercest drives that the Yanks put over. We went over three times in October and were out time after time at night working between the lines. We were not over very long but we went the route while

we were here. About the 15th of October we started to operate narrow gauge railroads. Those are lines that carry the men and munitions from the large railroads up to the front. I had the wrecking crew and was very busy. We had one bridge on our line that the Fritz blew down every day and sometimes oftener. He would throw over a hundred or so of high explosive shells and then wait a while until the wrecking crew started to rebuild it, then he would send over a number of gas shells; and he knew the range and could put them where he wanted to. It was very hot work. I got an over dose of gas at that place, but am now fully recovered with no ill effects whatever. I have been at Ruhopost the last week attending gas school and am now on the road back to my company which is stationed at Coblenz, Germany, up the Rhine 60 or 70 miles from Cologne. I don't have any idea when we will start for home but I think we will be home by June or July, in fact I think we will be home before that time, but I like to allow plenty of time and then there will be no disappointments.
