\$60 Bonus

An Act of February 21, 1919, authorizes the payment of a bonus of \$60 to soldiers honorably discharged since April 6, 1917.

Those who have been discharged and received their final pay without the \$60 bonus should write the Zone Finance Officer, Lemon Building, Washington, D. C., stating their service since April 6, 1917, the date of last discharge and their present address to which they desire checks sent, and enclosing their discharge certificate or military order for discharge if both were issued.
