Mrs. Woolsey's maiden name was Emma Bonney and she was the daughter of A. A. Bonney of Tygh Valley. She was born at Gervais in Marion county March 5, 1876, and came to The Dalles with her parents while she was a

child. She had made her home at Tygh Valley ever since. In 1904 she was married to Mr. Woolsey and besides her husband five children survive as follows: Harold Frances, Roland, Robert and Josephine.
