Home from France

A. E. F. Bordeaux, May 18, 1919 Dear Folks:

I will write you the last time from France for we start for the boat at 10:30. I received the Maupin Times this morning, date April 11. It was only a month and two days on its journey.

I was lucky in getting a fourteen day furlough; went to Lille, Rys, Brussels, Belgium and along the Hindenburg line from Archers to Soissons and out to La fiam on the north end of the battle of Arogon. Saw many interesting sights, only ran out of time. Got to camp the first of May and was put into the barber shop to trim up the boys for homeward journey. We had several dances and shows just before leaving camp and when we left at 4:30 the 10th, all of the boys were out in spite of the awful rain storm. We landed in Bordeaux at 9:30 and hiked five miles to camp; next morning went through the De lousier; spent yesterday looking to the show; today off for home.
